

Campbellville wins squeaker over Leaside club 22-21

Forty-three runs crossed the plate in Campbellville Sunday afternoon in the greatest run feast the village fans have ever seen. Fortunately Campbellville were the winners by a score of 22-21 over Leaside. The victory was Campbellville's third in four days and gave them a seasons' record of five wins and three losses.

Obviously the pitching for both teams left a lot to be desired. None of the eight pitchers (four each) were effective in any way. Garnet Mitchell, Ray Tonelli, Bob Lee and Elmer Dredge toiled in that order for Campbellville with Dredge getting credit for the win. They allowed 21 runs off 20 hits. They struck out seven, walked 11 and hit two batters. Wylie, McBride, Kawa and Fleury were the Leaside pitchers and they allowed 22 runs off 23 hits. They struck-out six and walked five.

The plate in the inning. Campbellville scored again in the second to make it 10-1 and then Leaside got two in the third the home team came right back in their half with four to build the score up to 14-3.

Each team scored in the fourth and Leaside picked up three in the fifth as did Campbellville to make it 18-7. Leaside really got rolling in the sixth and seventh as they scored five runs in the one inning and nine in the next while shutting Campbellville out. At the end of the seventh the team that at one point had been losing by 11 runs were now leading 21-18. Leaside were scoreless in the eighth but in their half Campbellville came up with four to take a 22-21 lead and then shut Leaside out in the ninth.

Dramatic eighth

In the dramatic eighth Clement led off with a walk but a strikeout and a pop-up had him still on first with two out. Andrews then singled and then Dredge's single drove home Clements and sent Andrews to second. A throwing error by the shortstop on Evans to ground allowed Andrews to score. Tonelli's single drove home Dredge with the tying run and Rick Mitchell's single, his fifth hit of the afternoon, drove in Evans with the winning run.

For Leaside Barry Smith hit two home-runs and a single. MacDonald and Osborne each had a double and two singles. Paniccia, Knight, and Sheppard each hit two singles. Kowa homered, Leonard doubled, Scott doubled and McBride and Fleury singled.

Mitchell leads

Rick Mitchell led the Campbellville attack with a double and four singles. Don Hearn hit two doubles and two singles. Peter Andrews doubled and singled twice. Wade Bekar and Ray Tonelli each homered and singled. Rick Clement singled twice. Loris Faggion and Garnet Mitchell both doubled, and Elmer Dredge, Bob Lee and Ray Evans singled.

Ron Nixon picked the mound victory for Lowville hurling five and a third innings allowing only four hits while striking out two. Paquette came in to relieve Nixon in the sixth throwing shut out ball and fanning four.

Gord Phillips took the loss as he went the distance giving up eight hits and fanning six. Paquette has completed 39 innings so far this season and has not given up a single run. Burlington will play in Lowville Friday at 8 p.m.
