"Perfect opportunity" job

The happy combination of the Halton Region Conservation Authority, the Ontario government's SWEEP project, and a girl who enjoys art, physics, math, and is interested in the environment, will result in some new buildings in conservation areas.

Karen Schilling makes a sort of a reverse commuting trip from Kitchener to Milton each week for a summer job which she calls "a perfect opportunity". She has just completed first year architecture at the University of Waterloo. Her perfect opportunity job is the designing of small buildings such as a Sugar Shanty for the Mounstberg Wildlife Preserve. The work was actually begun by another Waterloo student working for the conservation authority in January, and Karen is finishing it in time for construction by SWEEP workers to begin on June 25. The cooperative program at Waterloo allows students to alternate four months of school with four months of work.

Karen works entirely on her own, making decisions as to materials and structures within a given budget. Few graduating architects have as much opportunity to apply their knowledge of drafting, statics and materials. In the case of the Sugar Shanty, Karen will specify material sizes to be made up in the conservation authority's own sawmill at Mounstberg.

Later Karen will be making sketches and doing some photography of scenes in the conservation authority's holdings. Plans are being made for a farm display some time in the fall.

Finishing up plans for a snack bar at Mounstberg Wildlife Preserve is Karen Schilling. She is an architecture student at the University of Waterloo, working with the Halton Region Conservation Authority for the summer.
