Judging of the posters will be based on originality, neatness, content and overall appearance.

There will be one winner chosen for each grade, from kindergarten to grade eight. Winners will receive 12 free tickets to the pool which can be used any time this summer.

All posters will be on display at the official opening of the Milton pool on July 1. At this time, the winners will be announced and the prizes awarded. This will be part of the aquatic program, which is being presented in conjunction with "Community Day". Although the official pool opening is on July 1, the first session of swimming lessons is scheduled to begin on June 25. Registration will begin on June 18 at the pool.

Variety of programs offered this summer

Drama, crafts, sports, music and a variety of games will highlight playground activity with special events such as track and field days, bicycle marathons and swimming to fill out the program.

Among the trained playground supervisors working on the program this year are Janet Brodie, Mary Jean Keilty, Liz Richardson, Anita Provaznik, Patricia Roche, Debbie Leggo, Ronnie Hill and Jane De Graaf. Ruddleigh MacLean, a Brampton School teacher will head up a teen activity program based at Milton District High School.

That program will include outdoor education, canoeing trips, gymnastics, basketball, swimming and golf. The three week program starting July 3 costs \$20 for registration.

The day camp program will be run at the scout camp north of town and will be held in four two week periods starting July 2. Boys and girls seven years old to 12 will be accepted. The program

includes music, nature lore, camp crafts, games, swimming, cookouts and special events.

Lu-Ann Lynde, Sandy MacKay, Frances Chapman and Nancy Noble will be day camp counsellors this year. Lu-Ann Lynde will be day camp director.

Travelling playground
