

Gooding buys Junior club names Bob Lee as coach

Vern Gooding has purchased a controlling interest in the Milton Continental Flyers, the town's junior hockey club. Gooding has been involved with junior for several years and played various roles in minor hockey before that.

Details of the transaction haven't been disclosed but club spokesman Harry Funk told The Champion Gooding had purchased all but one share, which Funk holds.

In his statement Funk, who has been active on the club executive for the past few years, noted Gooding would be making the decisions. He said the move was made in hopes of a successful hockey club.

Funk said the club policy would be to go without imports. He said he and Gooding felt it was possible to do this if the best use were made from players coming up from Milton minor hockey teams in the town.

Seven imports

Last year the club was allowed seven imports. The number of boys from outside the area on the club has been a criticism from a number of fans for a number of years. The owners hope the new policy will boost crowds.

Crowds at junior hockey games in Milton have dwindled over the past few years. In fact they have never been as great since Georgetown dropped out of the league about four years ago.

The no-import policy won't restrict the club to players living in the political boundaries of the town. They can draw from surrounding areas and since Georgetown folded, have drawn some players from that town.

Good minor system

"We have a very good minor hockey system in town and we

would like to do our part in encouraging them. The only way we can do this is by orientating the club towards Milton players. We want a Milton spirited club," Funk said.

In keeping with the policy of emphasis on local talent, Funk announced Bob "Pie" Lee has been named as head coach of the hockey club for the coming year. Enio Scisizzi will assist Lee in coaching duties. Both Lee and Scisizzi assisted coach Bert Brown last year. Both are considered to be knowledgeable hockey men.

Lee graduated from Michigan Technological University with a B.S. degree in Business Administration in 1972. He attended Michigan Tech on a hockey scholarship.

He played goal for a number of Milton minor teams and had an excellent junior hockey career and excelled in college hockey. He had a tryout with the Atlanta Flames but his career there was terminated when he was hit with a puck and suffered eye damage. He played goal.

Jr. hockey day

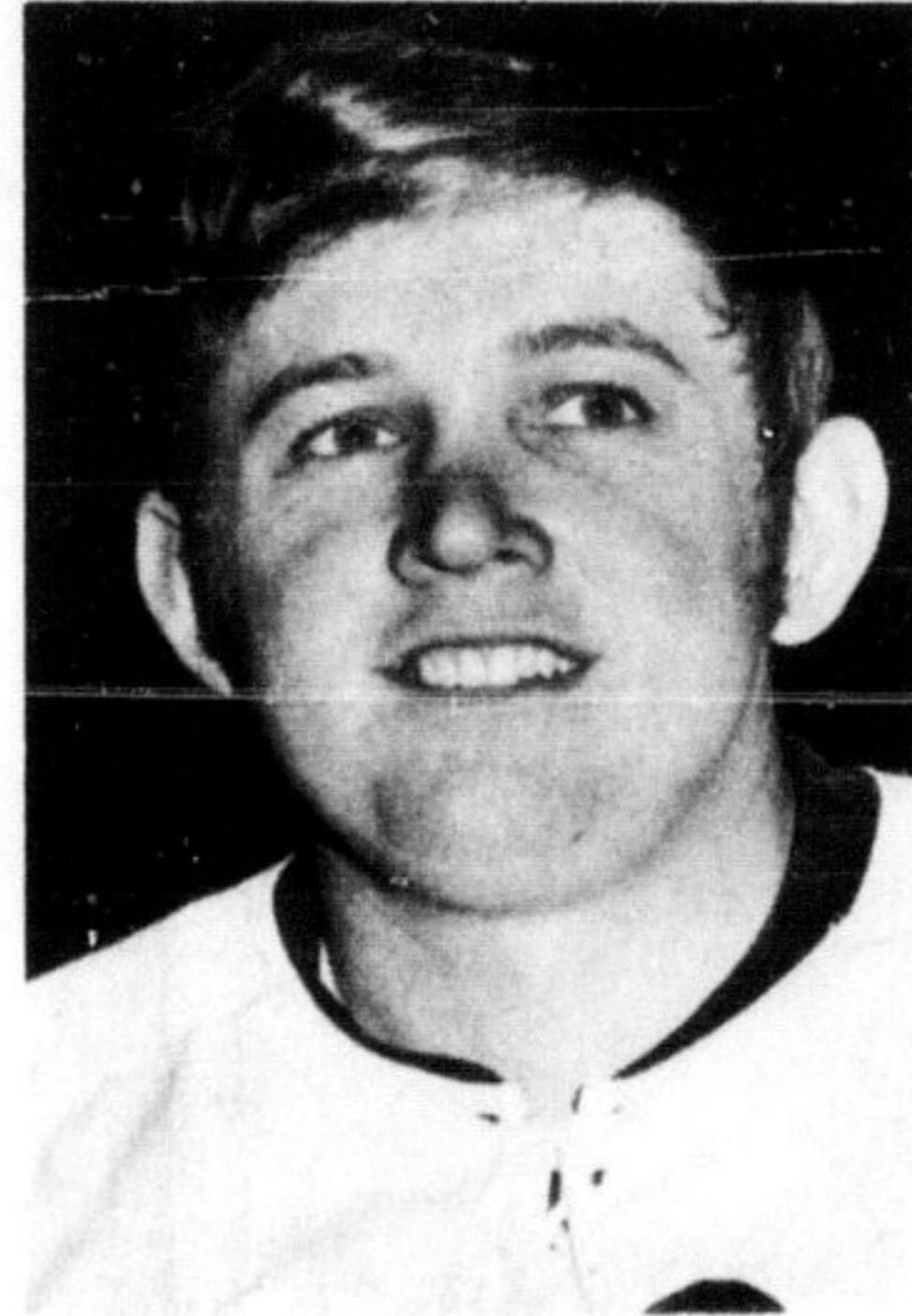
The new owners have planned a dance and July Beer Festival for July 7 at Milton Arena. They intend to serve beer at Milton

Garnet Mitchell does it all for Campbellville

Supported by some superb pressure pitching by Garnet Mitchell, Campbellville slipped by Oakville 7-6 in 13 innings in one of the most exciting games of the year played on Sunday.

Mitchell went the entire 13 innings for Campbellville. He shut out Oakville over the last six innings and held them hitless over the last five. In all, he allowed six runs off eight hits. He struck-out 13, walked three and hit one batter. Currie, Edwards and McKenzie shared the hurling duties for Oakville. They allowed seven runs off 14 hits. They struck-out seven and walked five.

Campbellville jumped into a 4-0 lead in the second, doing most of the damage with two out. Clement walked, went to second on Garnet Mitchell's single and to third when Rick Mitchell grounded to the pitcher. Garnet was forced out at second.

With runners on first and third, Hearn's double drove in Clement and Rick Mitchell and then he scored on Dredge's single. Dredge took second on the throw in and scored on Faggion's single.

Tie game

Oakville tied it up by scoring four times in the top of the fourth. Savin doubled, Lawrence was hit by the pitcher, and then Currie's double drove in one run and Hall's homer over the left field fence accounted for three more.

Campbellville came back to score in the bottom half of the inning and take a 5-4 lead. Garnet Mitchell singled, and went to second when Rick Mitchell's

grounder went through the Oakville third baseman. Both runners were sacrificed one base and then Elmer Dredge grounded to the short stop who threw wildly home trying to get Garnet Mitchell at the plate.

Oakville again tied it up 5-5, as they scored one in the top of the fifth. Edwards singled and Delegrade grounded to Mitchell who threw to second to force Edwards but Hearn's dropped the throw. Both men were sacrificed on and then Edwards scored on an infield out.

Clement homers
Campbellville went ahead for the third time in the game when Rick Clement powered a home-run over the right field fence to make it 6-5.

For the third time in the game Oakville tied it up. Delegrade opened the seventh with a single and went to second as Conrad singled off Mitchell's glove. He was sacrificed to third and scored on a sacrifice fly to make it 6-6.

This completed the scoring until the 13th although Oakville left a man on third in the eighth and in the 13th. Campbellville during the same stretch left men on first and second in the ninth, third in the eleventh and first in the twelfth.

Rick Mitchell opened the bottom half of the 13th with a single. Don Hearn, attempting to lay down a sacrifice bunt, bunted the ball high. It dropped fair over the head of the charging Oakville first baseman and Hearn's was safe. Dredge sacrificed both men along and then Faggion singled into the left field corner, driving home

Mitchell with the winning run.

Sensational catch

There were many great fielding plays in the game but perhaps the most sensational was Peter Andrews' diving, somersaulting catch off Bishop's fly ball in centre field. The catch ended the fifth inning for Oakville and left a runner stranded on third. George Chester took a hit away from Hall with a fine running catch in the eighth and Rick Clement robbed Delegrade of extra bases when he took his fly against the fence in the ninth.

A Faggion to Hearn's to Evans double play was snappily executed and got Mitchell out of trouble in the sixth. Right fielder Scarrow from Oakville put the game into extra innings when he came from nowhere to pull in Clement's drive in the bottom of the ninth.

Don Hearn's with a double and two singles led the Campbellville attack. Rick Mitchell, Elmer Dredge, Loris Faggion, and pitcher Garnet Mitchell all singled twice. Rick Clement homered and George Chester and Ray Evans both singled.

Footnotes: The win was Campbellville's seventh in a row and eighth without a loss. They are now firmly entrenched in second place with nine wins and three losses, behind Dundas which has a nine win, one loss record. Burlington is in third place and Oakville is fourth.

Campbellville played without hard hitting Wade Bekar who sprained his ankle in Preston the previous day.

Campbellville's next home game is at 2:30 p.m. on Sunday, July 1, with Preston supplying the opposition. It will be the final meeting of the season of these two teams.

Registration down

Where are all the hockey players?

Milton Minor Hockey executives will discuss at their regular meeting tonight (Wednesday) whether to hold another registration day, due to the small number registered to date.

Only 400 boys have registered so far compared with 709 last year. John McLean, president of M.M.H.A. said as many as 825 can be registered this year. He told The Champion, "We could
