
Details of the transaction haven't been disclosed but club spokesman Harry Funk told The Champion Gooding had purchased all but one share, which Funk holds.

Good minor system

"We have a very good minor hockey system in town and we

would like to do our part in encouraging them. The only way we can do this is by orientating the club towards Milton players. We want a Milton spirited club," Funk said.

In keeping with the policy of emphasis on local talent, Funk announced Bob "Pie" Lee has been named as head coach of the hockey club for the coming year. Enio Sclisizzi will assist Lee in coaching duties. Both Lee and Sclisizzi assisted coach Bert Brown last year. Both are considered to be knowledgeable hockey men.

Lee graduated from Michigan Technological University with a B.S. degree in Business Administration in 1972. He attended Michigan Tech on a hockey scholarship.

He played goal for a number of Milton minor teams and had an excellent junior hockey career and excelled in college hockey. He had a tryout with the Atlanta Flames but his career there was terminated when he was hit with a puck and suffered eye damage. He played goal.

Jr. hockey day


The new owners have planned a dance and July Beer Festival for July 7 at Milton Arena. They intend to serve beer at Milton




