Considering he was playing for the Ottawa team at the time, this could be considered strange. However, Tom says that the players had heard the team might be moving to Toronto as far back as last fall.

Tom said, "We figured the team was moving to Toronto. The prices were good at the time and we're not far from Toronto, so we bought the house." When asked how he enjoyed living in Milton, Tom replied, "We enjoy it here, we're beginning to like it more and more. I belong to a golf course, we enjoy the nearby parks and it's nice downtown. 
