## Capt. Donna Paupst posted to Kingston

Captain Donna Paupst of Milton will be transferred July 9 from her post at the Canadian Forces Headquarters hospital in Cold Lake Alta. to the CFB Hospital in Kingston.

Capt. Paupst is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Paupst of 313 Elmwood Cres. and is making her career of nursing in the Canadian Armed Forces an interesting one.

A graduate of the school of nursing at Toronto Western Hospital, she graduated from University of Western Ontario in 1955 with a degree in Administration and Clinical Nursing (BScN). The following year she joined the armed forces and since then has been hopping about Canada and overseas with postings to medical units including Trenton, Rockcliffe, Sea Island, Goose Bay, the National Defence Medical Centre in Ottawa, Zweibrücken Germany, Kingston and Halifax. In 1971 she took a six months intensive care course at Winnipeg General Hospital, then was posted to Cold Lake.

**Flight course**  
In 1958 while serving at RCAF Station Trenton, Capt. Paupst

was selected for a Flight Nurses' course with the U.S. Air Force. This course consisted of six weeks on theory in the Flight School at Gunter AFB in Alabama and 12 weeks as a crew member with an air evacuation squadron at MacGuire Base in New Jersey.

She had a two year tour of duty at RCAF Station Rockcliffe, then was posted to the Search and Rescue Unit at Sea Island, B.C. Her first air evacuation trip was a memorable one when a supposedly routine 20 minute trip from Sea Island to Pat Bay on Vancouver Island ended two and a half hours later. The plane had landing gear problems and was only able to land after the crew manually lowered the wheels (And that was her first day of duty at Sea Island!)

At Cold Lake she is Director of Nursing (Matron) and responsible for the administration of all nursing. She will be Matron at Kingston too.

Her parents are looking forward to seeing more of Donna, with her posting back to an Ontario base.

## Institute renews memories pioneer

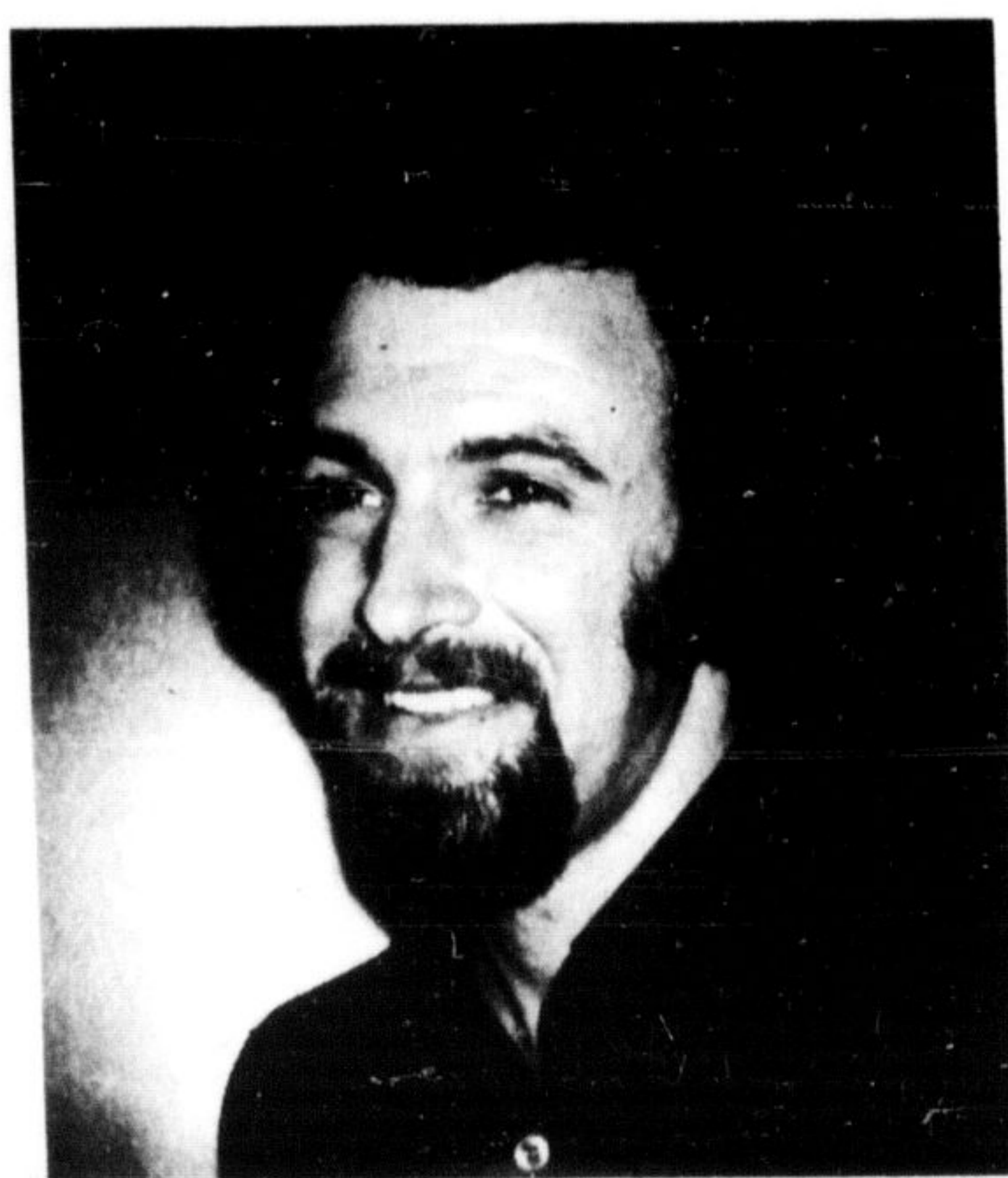
