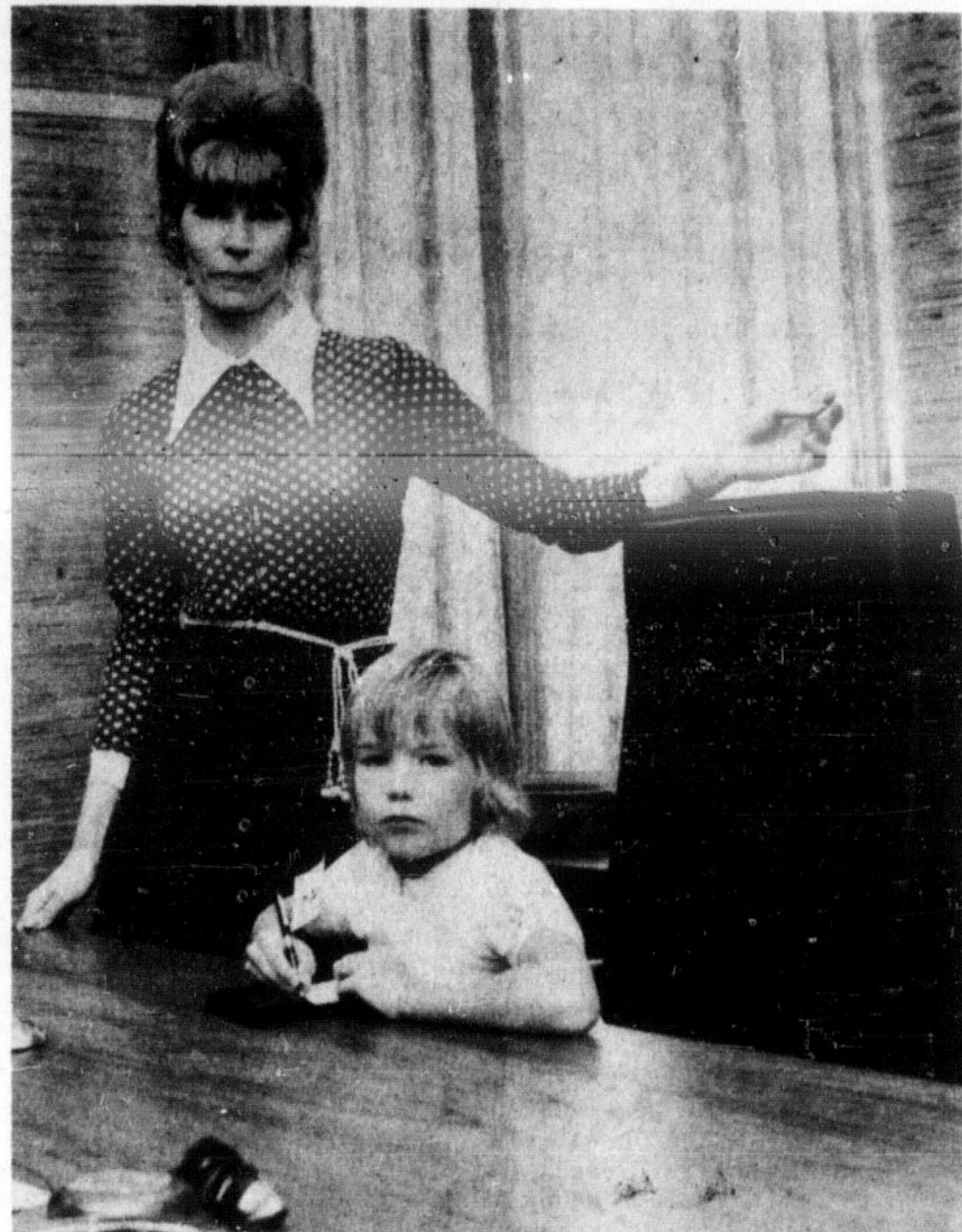

Lawn Bowling Club plans expansion, asks for \$1,000 grant

An application for a \$1,000 grant in 1974 to assist the Milton Lawn Bowling Club to expand its present building, will be referred to the next council, members of the Parks and Recreation Committee agreed last week.

The application indicated the Club was planning a 16 foot by 24 foot addition and the expansion of parking facilities.

Since the current board will be dissolved at the end of this year it was felt action would have to be taken by the council which will be responsible for parks and recreation in the new year.

Trees healthy

A report on trees in the Kingsleigh Court Park indicated the poplars were healthy and it would be a shame to cut them down although a group of residents bordering the park had petitioned for their removal. It was noted the trees were planted by the city a number of years ago to improve the park.

Complaints from the Victoria Park area about ball playing in the park were heard. The Committee indicated that it didn't encourage ball in the small park and no back stop was provided, but it was not board policy to restrict the park from the use of the youngsters.

Dorset Park

The Committee agreed to write Council to determine when the parks in the Dorset Park area would be available, what condition they would be left in by developers, and when the Board should undertake maintenance.

Programs being operated this summer were reviewed. It was noted the teen activity program had not been initiated because of

a lack of interest. Basketball had begun, day camp, playgrounds and the retarded children's programs were all operating as well as the pool. The pool had established heavy use and lessons were fully enrolled with interest heavy in the remaining two periods.

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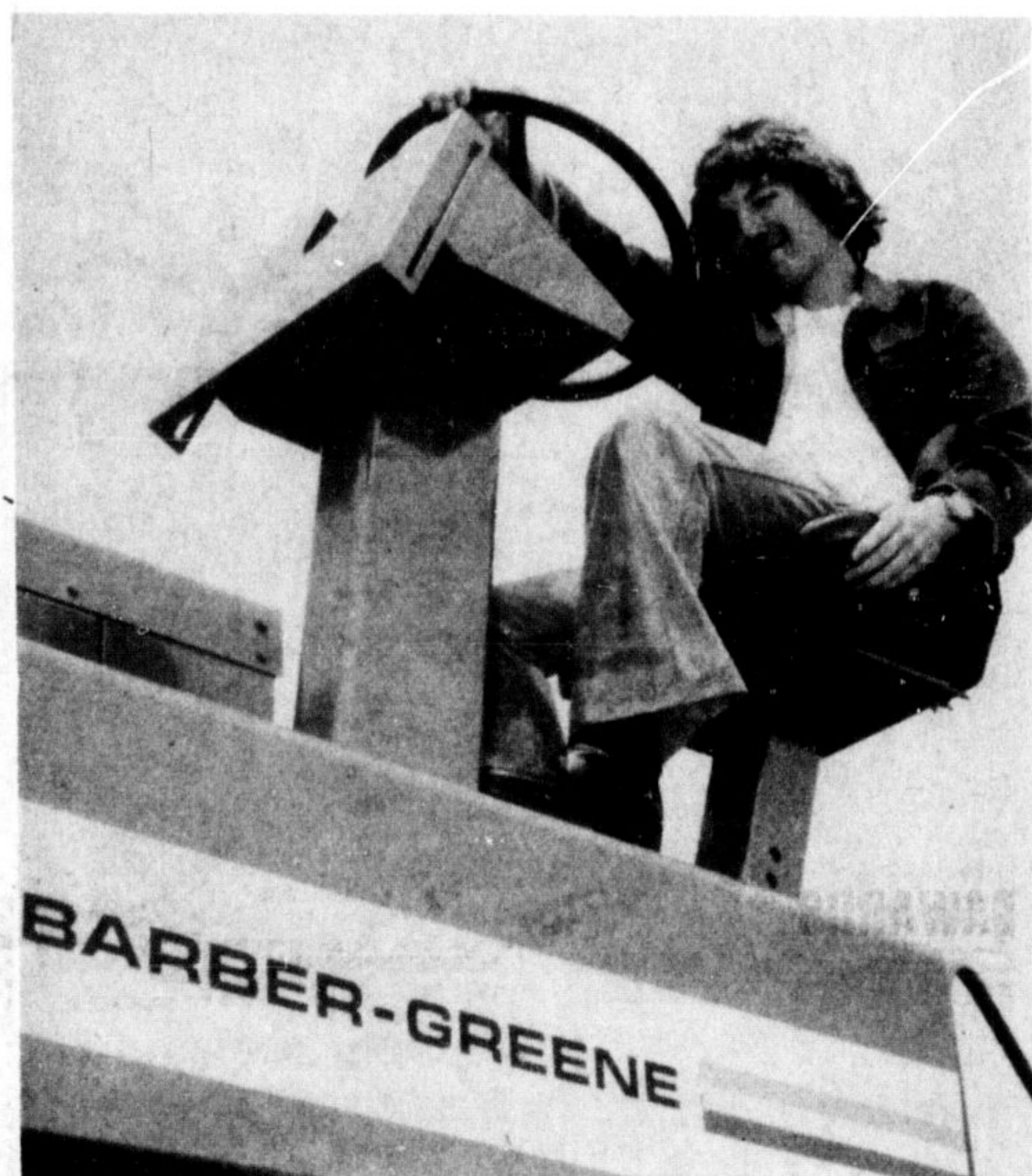
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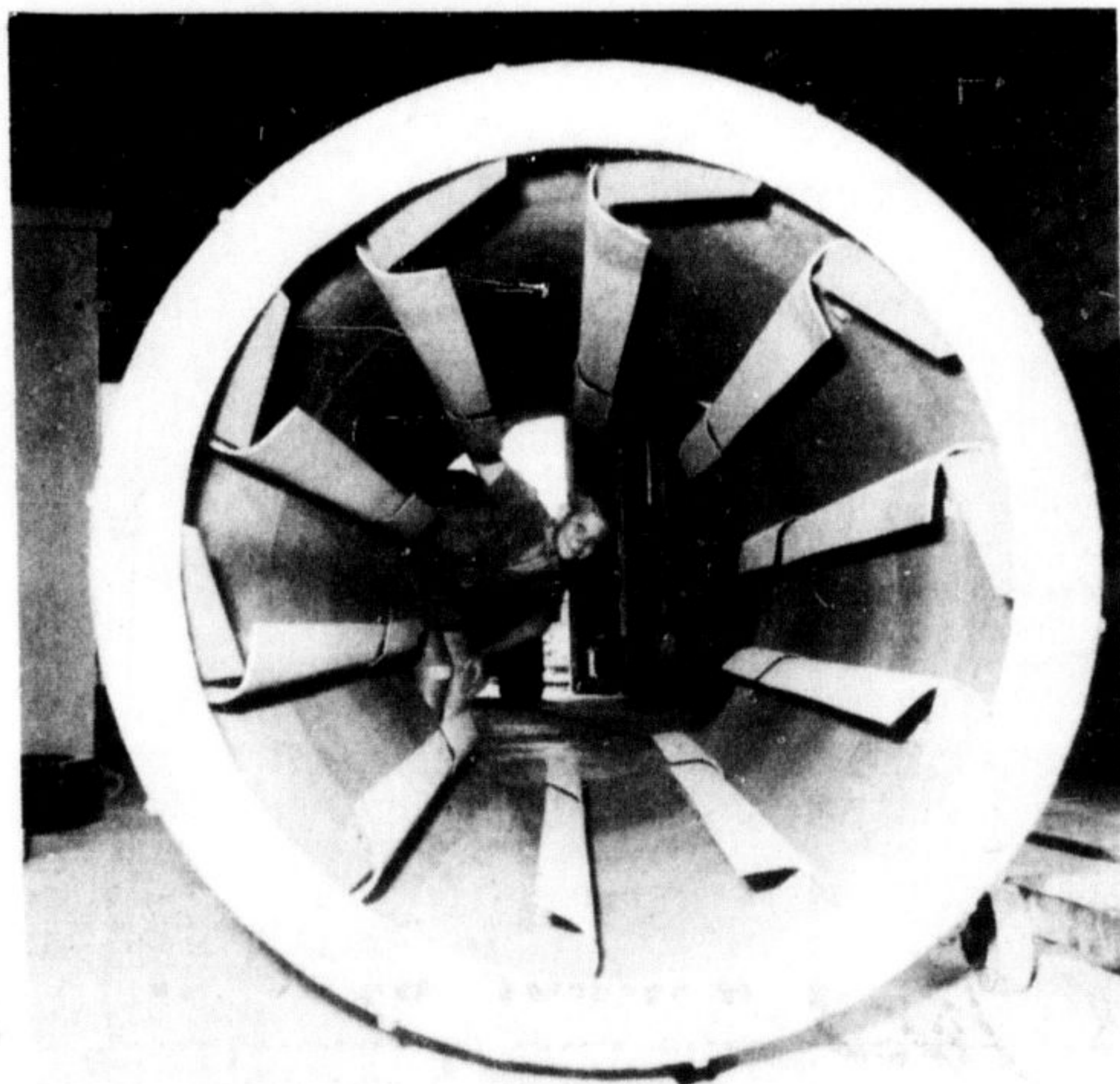

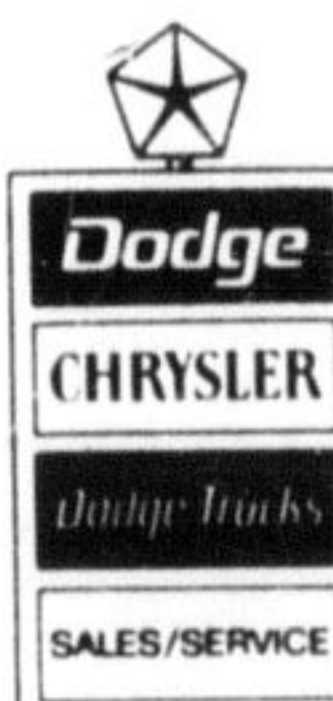
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
