



## Lawn Bowling Club plans expansion, asks for \$1,000 grant

An application for a \$1,000 grant in 1974 to assist the Milton Lawn Bowling Club to expand its present building, will be referred to the next council, members of the Parks and Recreation

Committee agreed last week. The application indicated the Club was planning a 16 foot by 24 foot addition and the expansion of parking facilities.

Since the current board will be dissolved at the end of this year it was felt action would have to be taken by the council which will be responsible for parks and recreation in the new year.
