Poor hospitality

Chiefs are tough guard first place

The league-leading Dundas Chiefs showed a distinct lack of hospitality on Saturday night in Dundas. They throttled the visiting Campbellville team 18-5, pounding out 24 hits including two long home runs.

Campbellville did manage five runs off Dundas pitcher Trevor Madden but after the second inning they were never really close.

Ray Tonelli started on the mound for Campbellville and gave up nine of the Dundas runs, absorbing his first loss of the season. Bob Lee relieved him in the second inning and finished the game.

Campbellville actually opened the game as though they were going to run away with the contest. Rudy Mitchell was safe on an infield error, Elmer Dredge singled him to second, and Rick Clement was hit, to load the bases. Mitchell came in on Ray Evans' infield out and then Steve Smith stroked a two run single.

The 3-0 lead was short lived though. Six singles and a two base error by right fielder Peter Andrews gave Dundas five runs and a lead they never again relinquished.

They added four more runs in the bottom of the second, this time on four singles, and infield error and a sacrifice fly. By this time Lee had entered the game for Campbellville. He held Dundas scoreless in the third, gave up a lead off home run to Don McPhail in the fourth and blanked them in the fifth. Meanwhile however, his teammates could not narrow the gap.

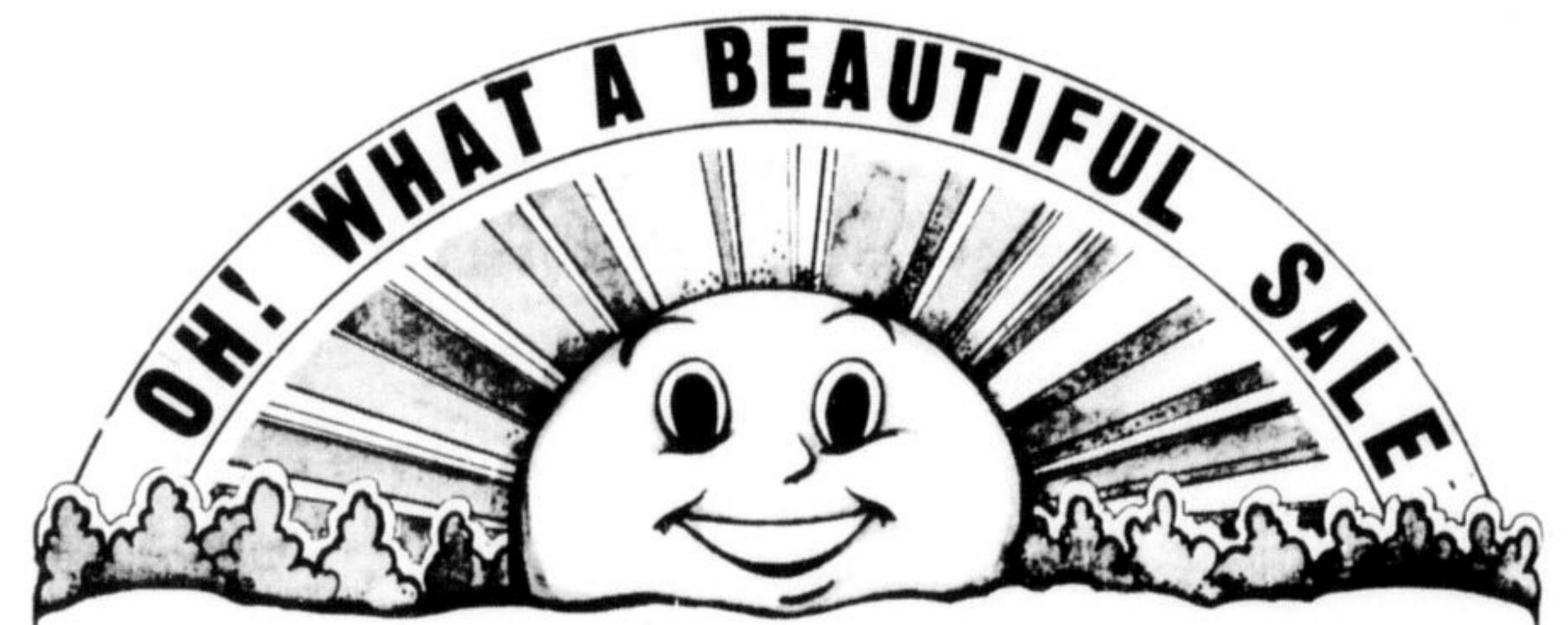
Tourney winners
