## Garden Bible Clubs held in local homes

One hundred and eight Milton children attended the seven daily Garden Bible Club sessions held at local homes last week as part of an international program sponsored by the Child Evangelism Fellowship.

In the one hour clubs, children sang and learned bible and missionary stories from two Toronto teachers each day. The teachers are two of a group trained by the

fellowship's Ontario office in June to work with children across the province during the summer months.

The outdoor bible clubs have been operating in Milton for 20 years, supervised by Mrs. T. Jennings. Plans for two clubs to operate one day a week after school from October to March have been made.

### HALTON COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION - BRIEFS -

At Thursday's meeting of the Halton County Board of Education, the board:

Was notified of the new structure for program councils and trustees were invited to volunteer to serve on one of the nine broad areas of endeavor to be studied.

Received a report from John Graham, Superintendent of Academic Operations, reviewing the organization of psychological services available.

Approved sketch plans and a tentative budget of \$212,000 for an addition to Rolling Meadows Public School.

Appointed David Wright as Science Consultant, effective Sept. 1. Wright has taught for eight years, five of which were at Nelson High School in Burlington.

Approved plans for an addition to Limehouse Public School valued at \$153,000. The project includes the addition of a staff room, health room, library resource centre and general purpose room with changing rooms.

Approved a transportation schedule for the coming school year and noted costs would be up by about two cents per elementary pupil per day and three cents per secondary school student.

Was introduced to Bill Tom of Burlington Central High School and Max Jackson of E. J. James, who will work as administrative assistants this year. Tom is the former vice-principal of Milton District High School.

Was presented with a notice of motion calling for standardized provincial tests for grade 13.

Received a letter from the Town of Acton notifying the board of the town's interest in having the Lions Club raise money for an indoor pool at Acton District High School. Superintendent of Business and Finance Bruce Lindley noted the pool would be smaller than an olympic size pool. He noted that once the agreement was reached it would be between the board and the town. However Lions are expected to raise the funds.

# EMO department reports shortage

According to a report by Halton Emergency Measures Coordinator Bill McCreary an inventory check in that department has determined a shortage of materials worth \$3,324.53. McCreary reported the short-comings in his monthly report to the administration committee of Halton County Council, Thursday.

McCreary took over the job in the spring after his predecessors Ron Beatty and Bruce McGregor had both left the post. Beatty followed McGregor and he served about one year in that capacity.

Items on the inventory shortage list were bought mostly in 1960 and some in 1963. Items reportedly missing included a mobile radio worth \$725, a generator worth \$670, two extension ladders worth \$202 and a

number of other tools and commodities.

Disorganized condition In his report McCreary said he had to spend a lot of time since taking the job on correcting the disorganized condition of the EMO office, storeroom and garage.

He told the council committee he had held meetings with volunteers and municipal personnel to discuss emergency peacetime planning and involvement of local groups.

He said emergency peacetime plans had been left in abeyance for the remainder of the year. He noted contingency emergency peacetime plans for the municipalities of Oakville and Burlington have been commenced in the event of a high water situation this fall.

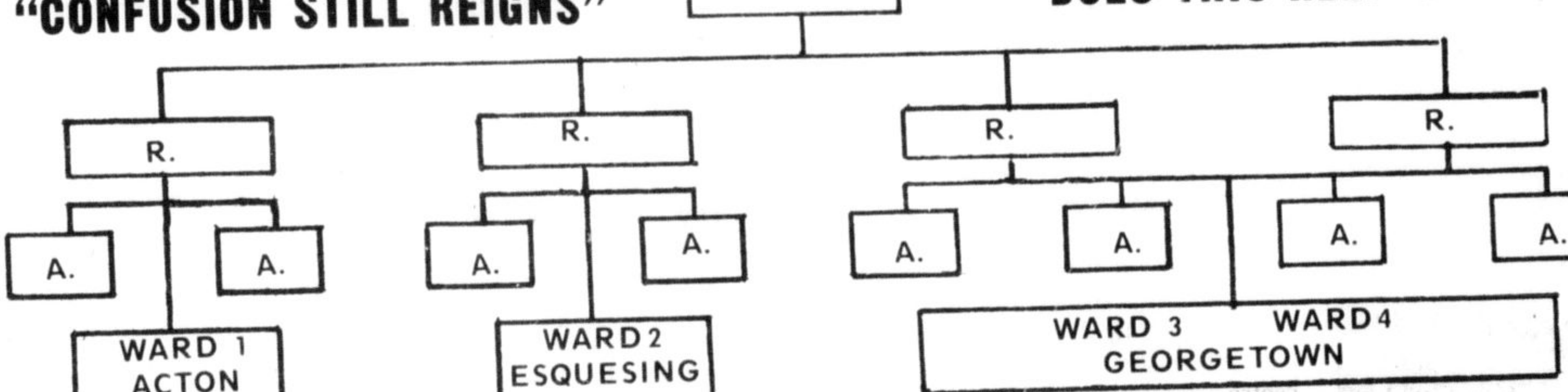

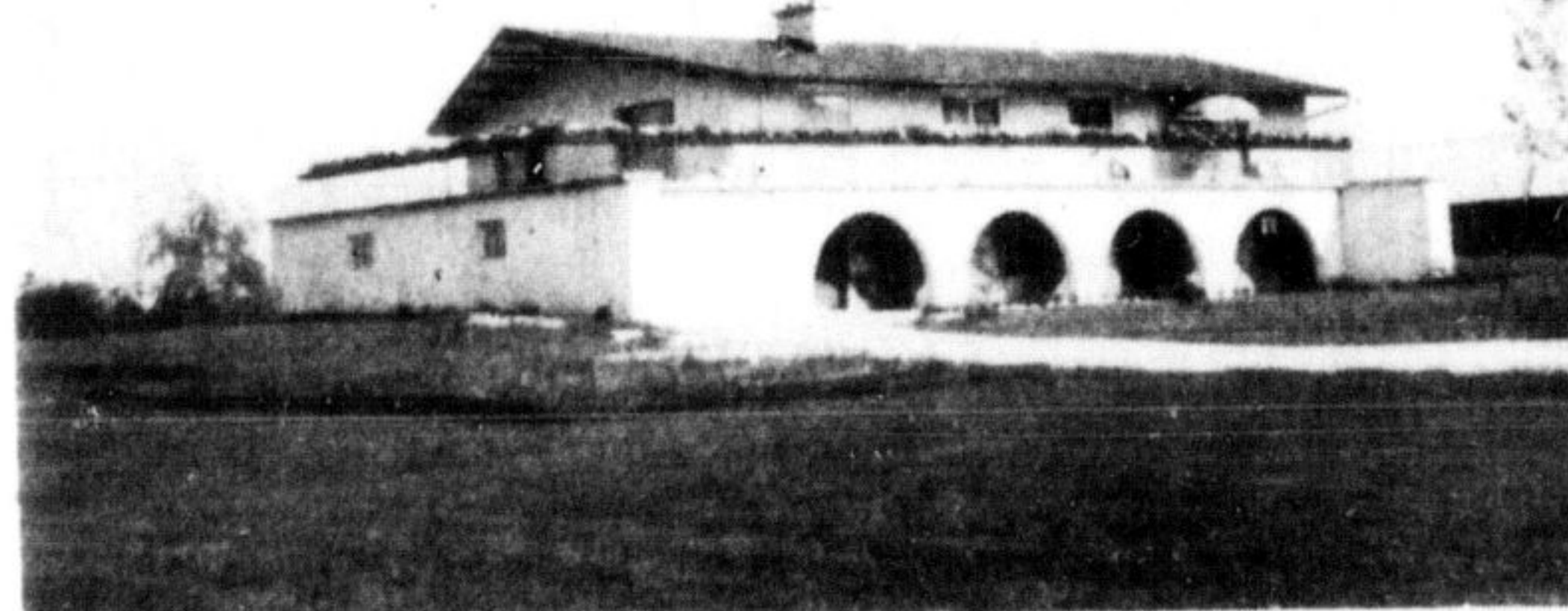
