Hockey clubs practice plan coaching clinic

The 1973 term of hockey school gets underway on Monday night (Sept. 17) as boys ranging in age from six to 17 have enrolled for pre-season courses.

The town rep teams have been holding tryouts this week and will be having more workouts in the next two weeks. OMHA has changed the names of some of the younger teams this season. Novice is the new name for the eight-year-old entry (boys born in 1965). They were formerly called "Mites". The Minor Novice and Novice entries are now called Minor Atom and Atom (boys born in 1964 and 1965 respectively). Dawson Ellison returns to the Atom club this season as coach and holds his first workout Thursday (tomorrow) night at 5:30.

The town rep. teams will once again play in the Tri-County League, competing with towns such as Streetsville, Ancaster, Dundas, Burlington, Oakville, Brampton, Guelph, Georgetown and Chinguacousy. This year however, the AAA centres (Guelph, Burlington, Oakville and Brampton) are putting their "first-stringers" into a separate league and Milton will be facing what was their select teams in the past couple of seasons.

The Monday Nighters or beginners program has been vastly changed this year. Marty Caputo heads up this section and the participants will be getting more time (one hour instead of 45 minutes) and also the program will be treated as a learning process throughout the season.

More emphasis on skating properly, etc. will be stressed. There will be a letter going out to all parents who have boys in this program to better explain what may be expected. Now that hunting season is about to open we will hear the century-old cry of "stop the hunter" from the so-called humanitarian, would-be conservationists, etc.

Without a trace of animosity I have talked with a lot of these people and can find some logic in their reasoning. Try as I may though, I cannot support their views that hunting should be banned.

Man's basic instinct is to hunt. Without hunting man could not have survived when he first settled our great country. Every crop needs to be harvested and we believe this applies to wildlife as well as to domestic animals.

Some of these people who feel hunting is cruel should spend an hour or two at the closest abattoir and see how their steaks and pork chops come into being.

I have yet to see one of these people refuse a roast of venison, a wild duck or a mess of fish filets.

Show us a hunter and we will show you a greater conservationist than those whose ideas come from a meeting or from a book.

The waterfowl season opens in the northern section Sept. 15 and runs until Dec. 15 in the central section from Sept. 29 to Dec. 15 and in the south from 12 noon Oct. 5 to Dec. 15. Partridge season will be opening Oct. 6 and running until Jan. 15 with rabbit season falling between Oct. 10 and Feb. 28.

Please note there is no open season on geese in North Drumries, Waterloo, West Luther, Guelph township, Puslinch, Orangeville reservoir and Wye Marsh.

Halton Sportsmen are asking you do not shoot geese in Halton County as we are trying to build some flocks of these beautiful birds. So far we are succeeding.

Remember fellows, you must have a regular Provincial Hunting Licence and a Canada Migratory Game Bird Hunting permit to shoot ducks and geese.

Members made a good showing in the Centennial Trap Shoot and Bronte and District Gun Club Saturday and Sunday. Herb Corp, Jim Smith, Dave and Gord Tuck and Ron and Don Marshall shot Saturday and in the handicap shoot Sunday.

Halton Sportsmen's Association have a beautiful flock of 150 pheasants, raised at the club, ready to be released in the next few weeks.

Donated by Herb Corp, these birds took a lot of care in the summer and the fellows deserve a lot of credit for their work. Most birds will be released in no hunting areas to try to build pheasant populations in Halton County.

We don't know of any sound more pleasing to the ear than the sharp crow of a cock pheasant on a crisp October morning.

Enter final series

Campbellville dumps Exeter

Campbellville closed in on the Ontario Intermediate "B" Championships, defeating Exeter 12-5 in Campbellville Sunday afternoon.

It was the first game of a best of three final series. All the remaining games will be in Exeter with the second game on Sunday, Sept. 16.

Although it was far from a classic pitchers' duel, Campbellville displayed one of their most aggressive offensive efforts for years as they smashed out 14 hits including four home runs and a double.

Early lead Exeter jumped into a 3-0 lead in the first when Bourne walked and went to third on Baynam's single. On a double steal, Mitchell threw into centre field with one run scoring and then Fairbairn homered over the left field fence to account for two more.

Campbellville got one back in the bottom of the first when Rudy Mitchell walked, stole second, went to third on an infield out and scored on

Dredge's single. In the bottom of the second, Campbellville scored five which turned out to be enough to win. Ray Evans homered over the right field fence with Steve Smith repeating the act to tie the game at 3-3. Rudy Mitchell singled, then Rick Clement singled to right centre.

Exeter was guilty of sloppy play on Clement's hit. They started throwing the ball around and Mitchell kept running and scored all the way from first with Clement going to second. Wade Bekar slammed a long home run over the centre field fence to put Campbellville ahead 6-3.

Ahead 7-3 Campbellville made it 7-3, scoring again in the third. Ray Evans singled and Smith walked to put men on first and second. Lee sacrificed both men in. Rudy Mitchell's single scored Evans.

Exeter came back with two in the fourth. Bourne walked and Hewitt and Schilbe singled to load the bases with no outs. Garnet Mitchell

replace Lee on the mound for Campbellville but an error allowed a run. The next came in on a sacrifice fly to make it a 7-5 game.

The score remained this way until the bottom of the eighth when Paft, who had replaced Gibson in the second, held Campbellville to one run off four hits over five and two-thirds innings.

Rudy Mitchell opened the bottom of the eighth with a single, then Clement beat out a bunt to put men on first and second. Bekar's grounder forced Mitchell to third, Faggion was hit by the pitcher to load the bases with one out. Dennis dropped a hit over second to score one run, then Don Hearn hit a long grand slam home run over the right centre-field fence to give Campbellville the 12-5 lead.

Bomb starter Gibson started for Exeter but only lasted one and a third innings as he gave up four runs off six hits and two

walks. He struck out one. Paft went the final six and two-thirds innings, allowing eight runs off eight hits. He walked three, struck out four and hit one batter.

Bob "pie" Lee started for Campbellville and in three innings gave up five runs off six hits. He walked two and struck out three.

Garnet Mitchell shut Exeter out in six innings of relief pitching. He allowed four hits, struck out five and hit a batter.

Baynam, Hewitt, and Farquar each hit two singles for Exeter. Fairbairn homered and Burton, Bourne and Schilbe all singled. Ray Evans homered, doubled and singled to lead the Campbellville attack while Rudy Mitchell was close behind with three singles. Don Hearn homered and singled, while Rick Clement singled twice. Wade Bekar and Steve Smith homered. Elmer Dredge and Bill Dennis, singled.
