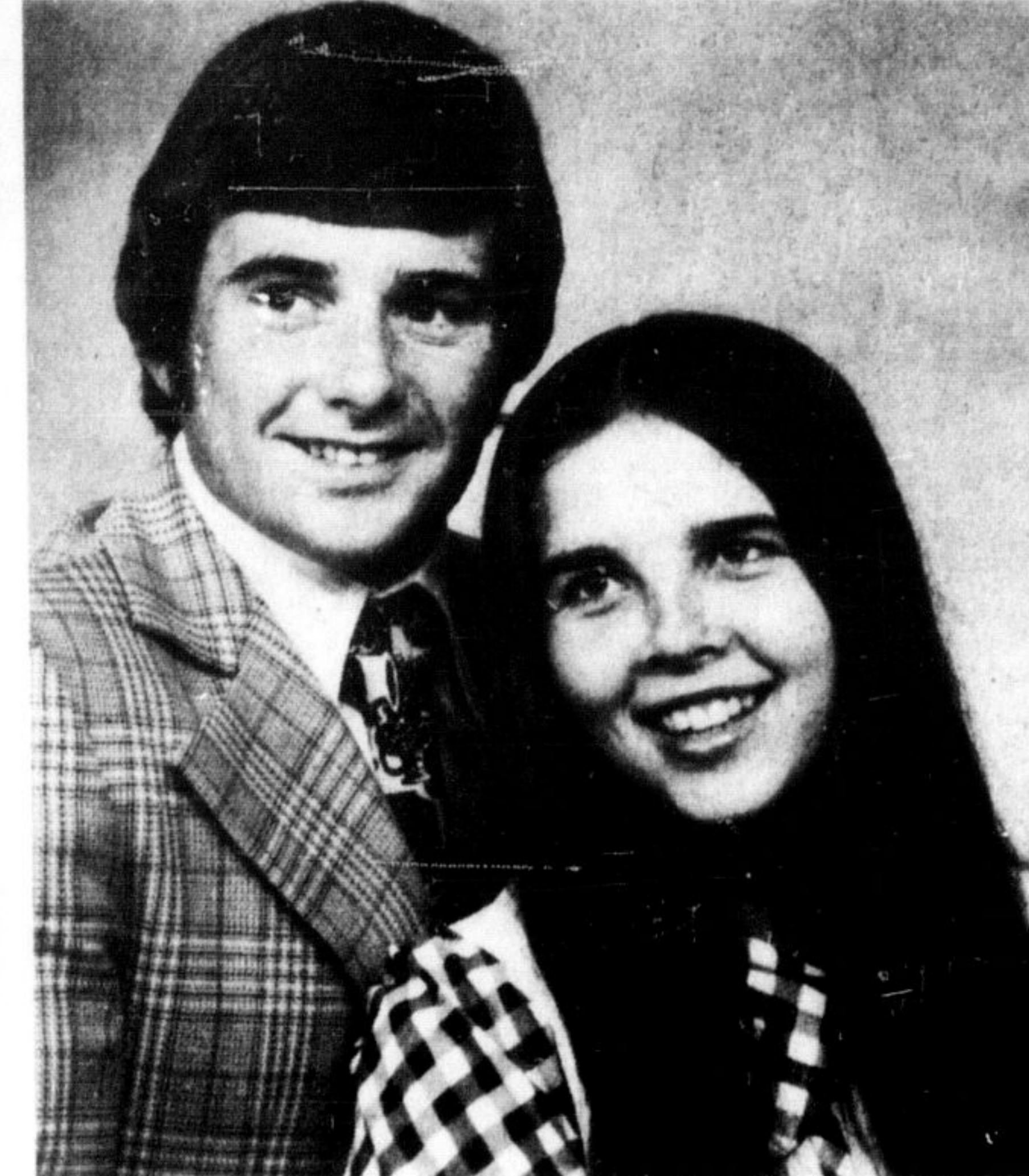

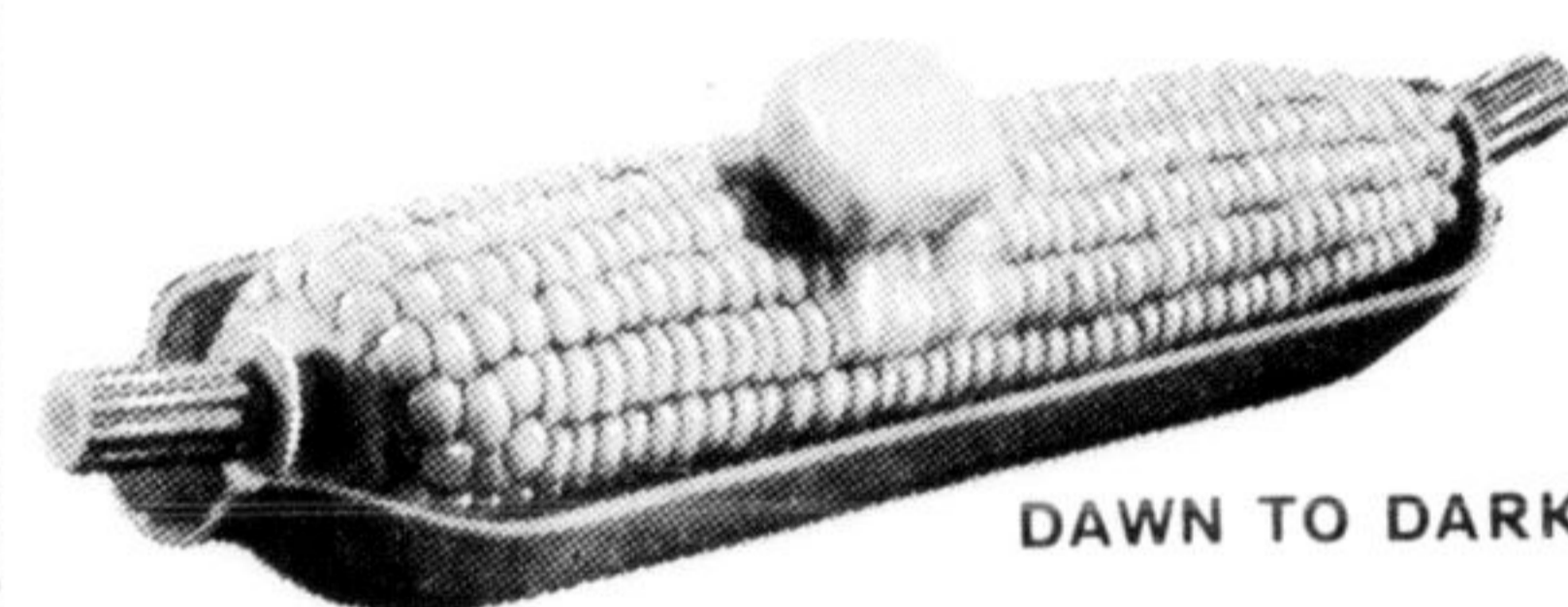
Picnics, tour held for Manor residents
