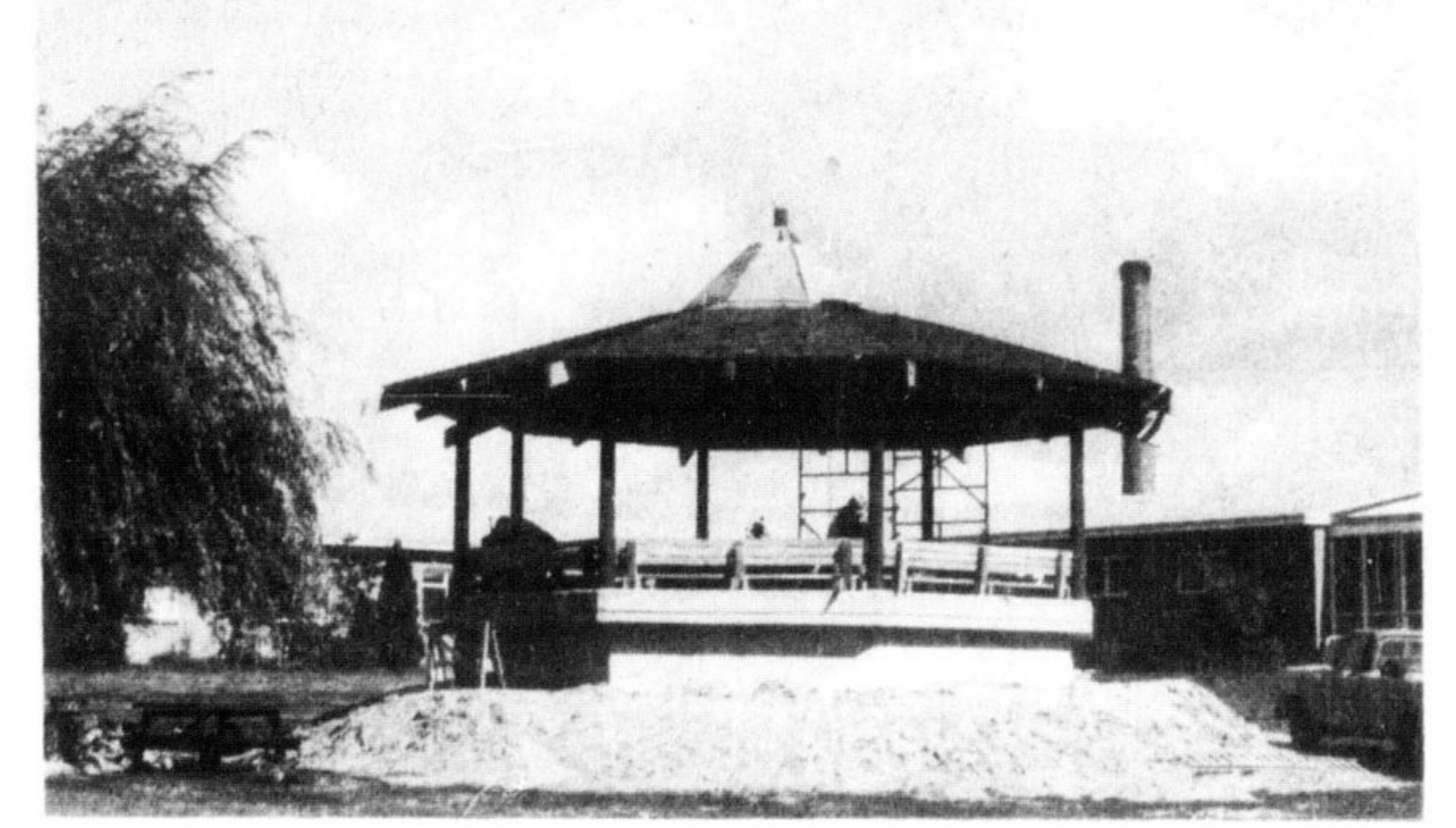

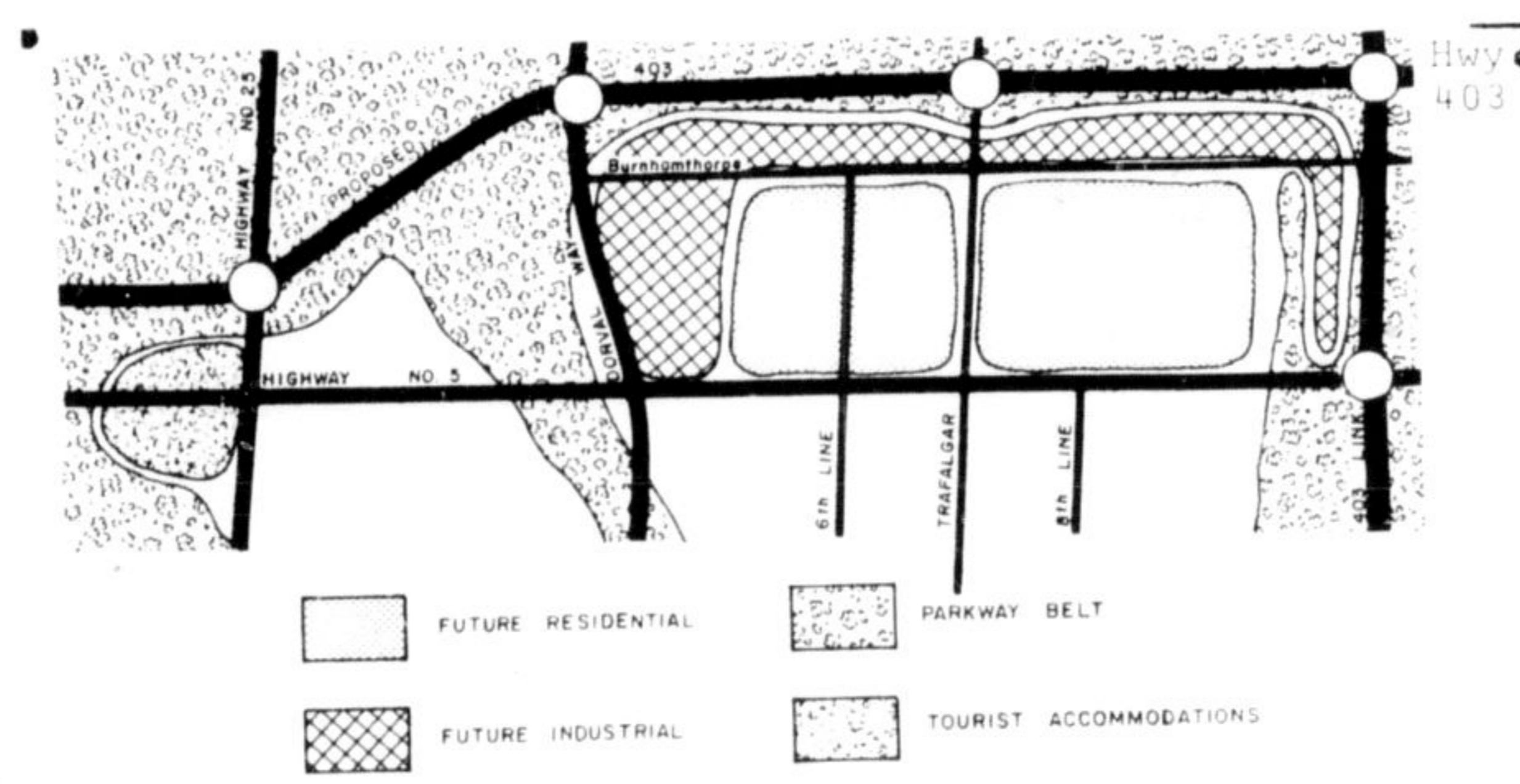

THE OAKVILLE PLANNING BOARD will consider adding the following proposals to the Official Plan, at a meeting at the OAKVILLE MUNICIPAL OFFICES, THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 13TH, 1973 AT 8:00 P.M.



### The reasons underlying these proposals are:

- 1) The substantial reductions in future industrial areas, due to the establishment of the Provincial Park, the Provincial Park Belt, and due to the reduction of Oakville area in the new Halton Region
- 2) The desirability of providing adequate future employment opportunities in reasonable proximity of future residential areas
- 3) The desirability of retaining a compact grouping of Central Oakville communities, unseparated by industrial uses, and providing employment beyond the fringes of such communities
- 4) A request by the Minister of Natural Resources, that Oakville consider sites for tourist accommodation in sympathy with the Bronte Creek Provincial Park.
