Morrow says he'll co-operate

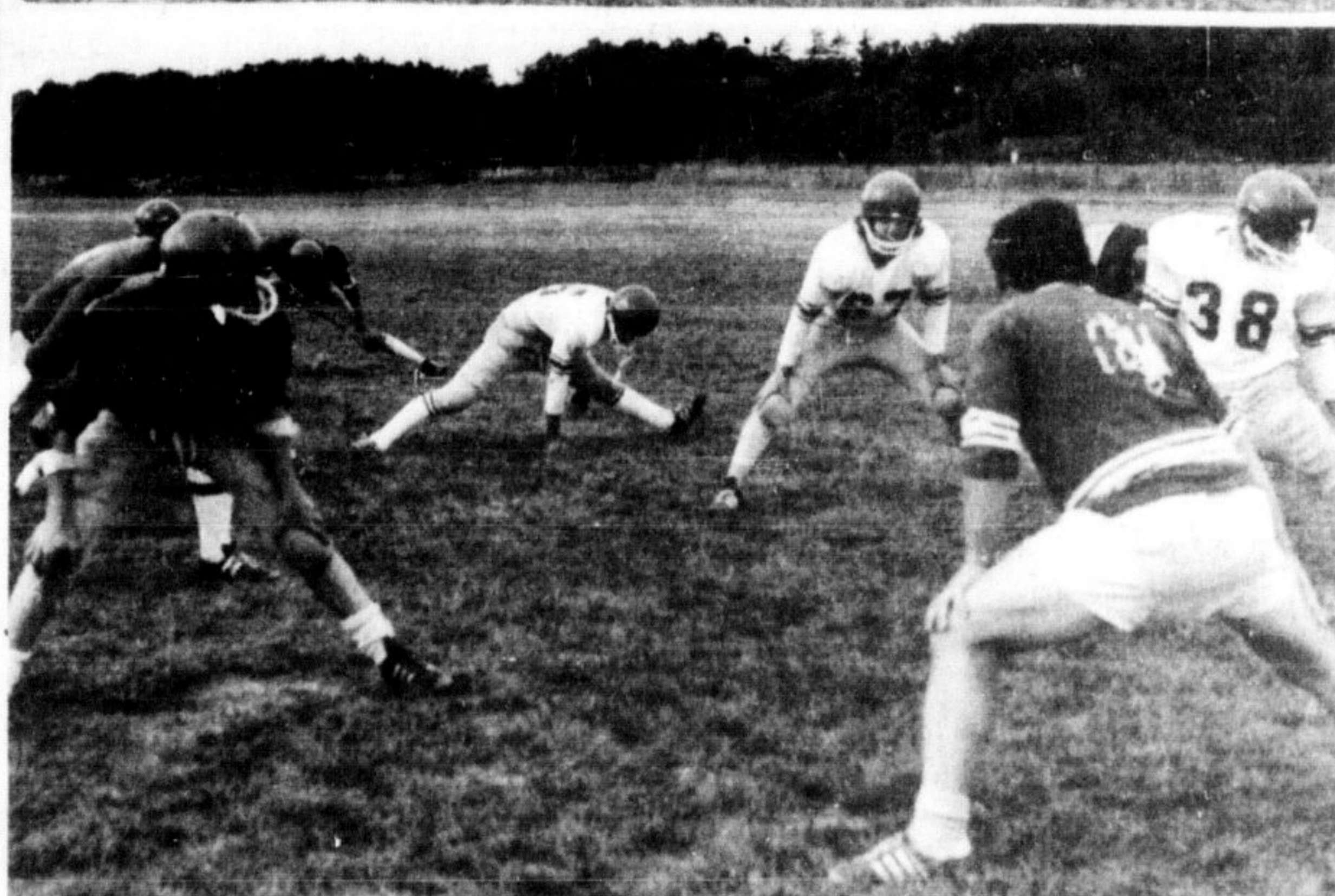

Approves \$1,000 for yule lights

A municipal grant of \$1,000 was approved by Milton Council Monday for the extension of Christmas street lighting which is being undertaken by the Milton Chamber of Commerce.

In a letter to Council the Chamber explained the total project was expected to cost \$5,000 and the Chamber would provide \$4,000.

New Christmas street lights were installed last year after reconstruction of Main St. It is proposed to lower these and position them vertically rather than horizontally.

Additions to the present system are also to be undertaken for Main St., Martin St., Milton Plaza and a start on Mill St.
