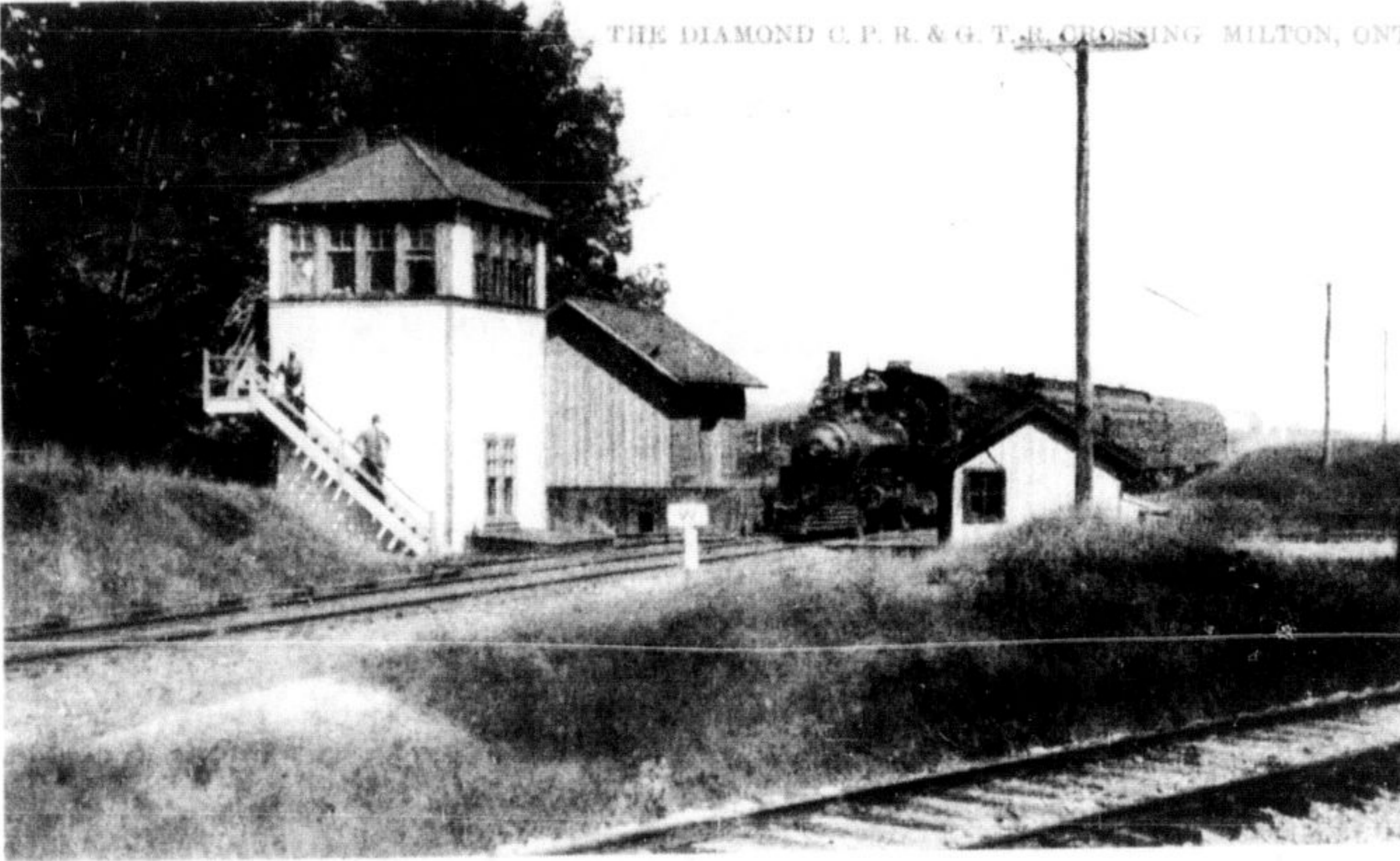

## Claims twp. needs mobile home park

With the gap between house prices and the financial means of young couples steadily increasing, Esqueying township should consider establishing a municipally-operated mobile home park. Glen Williams resident Harm Koeslag suggested at last week's regular council meeting. The township presently has a by-law prohibiting any more mobile homes except in Willow Park, Norval, a licensed area.

"Young couples now don't have a chance to get out of an apartment building. They could buy a mobile home at a third the cost of a house", Koeslag told council.

Koeslag said he would like to see a mobile home park run by an organization which is not out to make money and suggested it be established before the regional government takeover.

"There may not be much chance to get it after that", he

warned.

Likes idea  
Recalling there is a mobile home park in Lambton County, Reeve Tom Hill said he liked Koeslag's suggestion, but wondered where council would draw the line in the number of mobile homes allowed.

Councillor George Malby cautioned that to offer space in such a park only to young people might be considered discriminatory. He also thought the project would be far more applicable after regional government begins, since the township could then combine with other areas for water and sewer hookups.

The possibility of council being criticized by private businessmen, after it has already turned down previous applications to establish mobile home parks caused Councillor Dick Howitt some concern.

"I can just see abuse being piled on council, but maybe there's some way around it" he said.

Reeve Hill concluded the discussion by saying nothing could be done about the suggestion until the township's zoning by-law is approved anyway, but he promised council would seek information about such parks from other municipalities immediately.

## Solid waste study

# Answer is still "no" committee insists

There will be no full blown program to gain public input in connection with Halton County's solid waste management study. That opinion was reiterated by Halton County Council's administration committee at a meeting last week.

County Engineer Jack Corbett had earlier asked the committee for permission to approach the province about provincial funding for the input program.

Committee members felt the program would appear to be an attempt to whitewash public opinion and they spoke and voted against the \$33,000 program even if it was provincially funded.

Accompanied by Wes Williamson and Gordon Johnson from the Ministry of the Environment and Doug Sexsmith from James F. McLaren, the firm engaged to do the study, Mr. Corbett asked the committee to reconsider their earlier decision.

Spend \$33,000  
Councillors felt that even if the \$33,000 was spent and all kinds of public input was received, there would still be the same amount of unhappy people once a decision was reached and the project would be held up three months.

Williamson said the province was interested in trying the public input approach and would fund the project completely as a pilot project. He indicated Halton was considered as a good place for the experiment.

Some members criticized the idea of the input program because they felt it was just a public relations gesture and would serve no real purpose. Others claimed the terms of reference were vague.

Not Responsible  
After much discussion Georgetown Reeve Ric Morrow put a motion on the floor that would acknowledge the ministry's right to hold the pilot project in Halton if it wished, but noted county council neither encouraged the public input project nor would take responsibility for it.

Williamson told the com-

mittee the ministry wasn't interested in carrying out the pilot project if the council wasn't prepared to co-operate and support the idea. "If you do not want to be involved in it, we are not interested."

Mr. Corbett was instructed

to have consultants bring in a report as soon as possible and to carry on without the full blown public input program.

Deputy Reeve Majorie Bodnar was the only member of the committee who did favor the input project.

## Trustee criticizes teachers' campaign

Georgetown education trustee Ernie Bodnar has criticized Ontario Secondary School Teachers Federation for an advertising campaign the Federation is currently carrying out in both the electronic and printed media.

The advertisements claim teachers are interested in excellence in the classroom and because of that, they are lobbying against restrictions on spendings imposed by the Ministry of Education.

Recently the ministry of education announced increases in the ceilings on spendings that the boards of education must live within. That announcement followed an intensive campaign by OSSTF, which claims the decision was a result of the lobby and in the latest version of their message to the people they indicate their dedication to excellence in the classroom lives on.

No connection  
Bodnar said he failed to see how ceilings were tied in with excellence in the classroom. He suggested teachers would be better off directing their

efforts to upgrading their degree of professionalism and should welcome the opportunity to take part in extra curricular activities and to get to know the students they teach.

During the same meeting Halton board chairman Bill Priestner told the board he was writing the minister a letter indicating the board's support for the increase to

cover the unexpected heavy burden on some boards imposed by inflationary trends. Priestner was critical of the ministry for leaving the decision as long as they did and leaving boards uncertain of whether or not teachers would withhold voluntary services.
