

Milton Council Briefs

During a meeting of Milton Council convened at 10:30 Monday following committee deliberations, members:

—Revealed that Clerk J. McGeachie had taken ill at

work earlier in the day and would be away from the office for at least a week. Members of Council agreed to undertake some responsibilities in the interim.

—Appointed D. A. McConachie to represent the town in the Ontario Municipal Board hearing regarding an application for rezoning to permit a dental clinic in the industrial area north of Main

St. east of Ontario.

—Approved an agreement with Knox Presbyterian Church for the purchase of property on Mary St. and the paving of some church property to permit off-street parking.

—Named Mayor Brian Best to represent the municipality at an OMB hearing in Nassagaweya in conjunction with Halton Region Conservation Authority. Both are opposing the application of Dufferin Quarries to extend the quarrying area to 850 acres. Opposition is based on the possible damaging effect the quarrying could have on the flows into Milton Falls and through the Sixteen Mile Creek.

—Approved the promotion of Ronald Oswald to second class constable on the Milton Police Force.

—Agreed to proceed with a tree planting program to a limit of \$1,000 for the planting of red maples on areas including Ontario St.

—Agreed to ask the Ministry of Transportation and Communication to consider a subsidized bus service linking

HRCA briefs

At an executive meeting of Halton Region Conservation Authority meeting Thursday night at the Halton County Building, the Authority:

—discussed the costs involved in having warning signals installed at the Canadian Pacific Railway tracks near Mountsberg.

Milton with the GO train facilities at a nearby station.

—Asked for a public meeting in Milton to be held by the Solandt Commission regarding the proposed hydro transmission line in Halton. Proposals released recently indicate a consultant's report proposed two lines north and south of Milton.

—Agreed to continue their action opposing the license for quarrying by David Lloyd George Co. and Springbank Gravel since no confirmation in writing of a verbal proposal had been received. The town is involved with the Conservation Authority and the Town of Burlington in the action.

—was informed the provincial government had accepted the 1973 budget.

—agreed to have Authority Manager Murray Stephen approach Queen's Park regarding the acquisition of lakefront property in Burlington. The land is at the junction of Lake Ontario and Tuck Creek.

—There are lots of election posters on poles around the town this week as candidates head into the home stretch for Monday's local and regional election.
