### EXPERTISE OF EXPERTS QUESTIONED

Dear Sir:

To say I was disturbed when I learned that Halton County Council wasn't going to listen to citizens' groups on the question of Halton's garbage disposal, but would take the advice of "experts," would be an understatement.

I was outraged! In the past we took the advice of experts and the result has been polluted wells, methane gas explosions, not to speak of the stinking, vermin ridden morasses we call "sanitary landfill sites."

In my opinion it is high time we questioned the expertise of these experts. (One doesn't have to be a gourmet to know when a meal is unpalatable.) In Halton there are re-cycling groups, conservation groups, and other informed people who can offer good advice on this question; a very important question that could cause a rift between north and South Halton that could never be healed.

I personally, am not an expert on garbage disposal, but I am informed enough to have been invited by a well known publishing house to write an article on the ultimate answer to the garbage problem. The article was accepted by the technical editors. I contend unsalvageable garbage should be incinerated to alleviate the energy crisis. There are many plants all over the world that burn garbage smokelessly and produce energy.

Cost? For brevity's sake I will quote only the city of Montreal's plant, initial cost \$15 million, but there are benefits. No, or little, air soil or water pollution. No vermin, no devaluation of property. The total cost of Montreal's garbage disposal \$5.50 per ton, will be slashed to \$3.00 per ton, the result of the sale of steam and monies derived from the salvaged materials, metals etc.

Now is the time to act on the garbage problem. In five years we will be up to our ears in garbage.

It is interesting to note that in the U.S.A. the State of Connecticut is spending \$295 million on a resource recovery program consisting of 10 plants. Each plant will separate reclaimables, metals, glass etc.

### Night school

## Still room to register

Night school courses start at Milton District High School next week, but many of the classes will only be half full, local co-ordinator Tom Houldcroft told The Champion.

About 15 are needed to fill most of the courses but registrations were around the six to eight mark in many of them, he said. Many of the courses will be run anyway and officials hope they can fill them up in the next week or so.

Registrations were held Tuesday evening of last week but further registrations will still be accepted, right up to the opening of the courses. All classes are scheduled to start one night next week.

Application forms for registrations can be found in an advertisement in today's paper. They are to be mailed to the Halton County Board of Education's central office in Burlington or can be taken to the local high school.

Several courses offering academic credits for grade 12 and 13 subjects will still be offered, despite a decline in registrations.

The following courses will definitely start next week, although there are openings in most of the classrooms:

Automotive credit, typing, brushup office skills, bookkeeping for a small business, conversational French, fitness and recreation for men and women, creative painting, yoga, furniture refinishing, flower arranging, small engines, motor mechanics for women and men, interior design for the home, creative stitchery, sewing and basic knit.

Senior citizens are welcome to take any of the courses at no charge.

The remainder will be incinerated to produce electrical power. The technology is here, we should end the archaic method of dumping garbage into quarries, ravines, excavations etc., or legislating our offal into someone else's back yard.
