

Girls' softball spotlight shines on Brookville

Brookville is rapidly gaining the same reputation for producing championship girls' softball teams that Campbellville has enjoyed over the years as an intermediate baseball factory.

Girls' teams in Brookville set a Tri-County Minor Softball League this year by winning three of the four championships available. Brookville captured the championship in the 10 and under, 13 and under and 16 and under age groups. In the 19 and under category, Brookville had no entry.

The 16 and under team also copied the ORSA midget "A" crown, after winning the "OR" banant title as a 15 and under team last year. Only a final round defeat at the hands of a strong Clarendon team kept the 13 and under girls from the ORSA championship in their division.

The first, for boys five to eight, should have them playing without competition; the second, for eight to 10 year olds, introduces them to mild competition; and the third, for boys 10 to 18, should encourage competition with continuing player development.

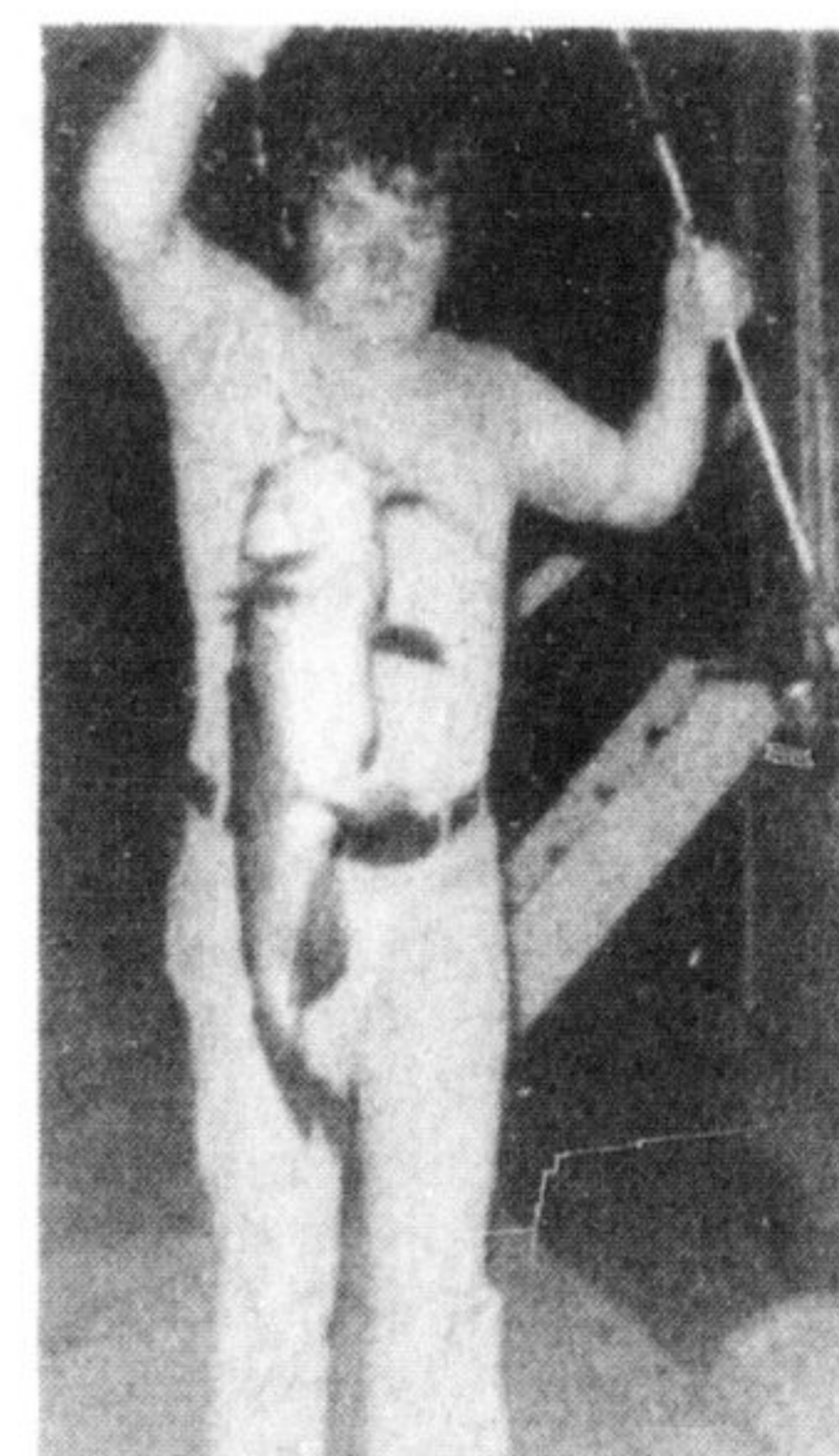
