Dick Moskal, a planner for the city of Burlington, was introduced and asked to comment on the Burlington brief. Moskal questioned the statement made by the Howlett Environmental Study that the latest plan would have the least environmental impact on the area. "The brief does not involve itself with the individual population, the soil, scenic qualities of Rattlesnake Point and Mount Nemo, the residential homes and historical buildings," he

Pointing out that each corridor would be 610' wide with towers 160' high and each line would contain five towers, he said, "The countryside from Guelph Line east is all open and these lines would be totally visible. Nowhere in the report does it say that lines of this magnitude and power could be put underground, and if they were put underground, what affect would it have on the flow of water? This is an area where all underground water supplies start and water may be cut off or raised as a result. Top soils would also be disturbed. The "visual clutter" would destroy the beauty of the area."

"The Parkway Belt," he continued, "has nothing to worry about because these areas are planned by provincial planners. Never once in the past three years did the provincial planners talk of a 500 KV line going in parkway belt land. Why didn't the provincial planners in the beginning just widen




