

Residents engage expert to fight hydro line route

Ratepayers from Kilbride and district met Wednesday to hear a progress report from their committee studying the hydro route proposals and to offer comments and suggestions concerning the proposed route to the Solandt Commission. Chairman Tom Patience told the nearly 60 people in attendance that the brief must be in to the commission by Oct. 15 and that public hearings will be held Oct. 22 and 23. All adjoining areas affected by the proposed route will be heard on the same day.

Assistance in preparing the brief has been asked of Prof. John W. Betak, assistant professor of geography at McMaster University, Hamilton. Prof. Betak has been engaged to prepare counter arguments and as this will cost money, Mr. Patience requested that all people donate as much as they can towards these additional costs.

"We need money for this fight, we promise we won't run to the Bahamas with your money," Patience quipped. "As your representative," he continued, "I assume everyone is against this plan. If not, please tell us now before we go any further with our arrangements." There were no replies.

presenting an alternate route, he replied "Yes we know we need the hydro power so we can't reject it outright."

Late involvement
Dr. Southward, secretary of the committee, asked Mr. Moskal why Burlington didn't become involved until the third stage. Moskal replied that the south was not originally affected but council was keeping an eye on all developments and was ready in case it became involved.

Don Carter, regional alderman, asked Moskal if he felt it was necessary for Kilbride to get outside help and when Moskal agreed it was, Carter made the first donation of money.

Referring to the BHI study which charged that the majority of municipalities did not assist in informing their

citizens to any active extent and only became concerned during the third series of meetings when it appeared their area might be directly affected, councillor Tom Foster defended his position by saying, "I'm taken back by these comments. The reason Kilbride was not informed was they were not at the time represented on the municipal council. This all happened before I was appointed to council, after Mrs. Foote died."

Another brief
Harold Middlebrook of the Halton County Council's Agricultural Committee, said his committee was supporting the Burlington brief as well as presenting one of its own. "Hydro is ignoring the lines now in use," he said, "it takes 62 acres of ground for each cone and they will not buy

anyone out unless they cross buildings, so they will steer clear of buildings."

Mr. Patience closed the meeting by urging each person who will be affected to write a letter of protest to the Solandt Commission, Ninth Floor, Ferguson Block, Queen's Park, Toronto or to phone them at (416) 965-1431. He also asked for additional information input from citizens to the committee (878-3470) and stressed the importance each citizen signing the questionnaire.

"As individuals we must let our feelings be known," he said, "I'm not a militant man but now we must stand for our rights, not sit on the fence, that way we'll never win, I'm tired of hearing we can't do anything about this."

Dr. Omund Solandt of the Solandt Commission, Queen's Park has consented to meet with the people of this area before making final decisions for the route of the 500 K.V. hydro corridor and substation proposed for this area. 610 feet wide. These will cut a path through fertile farm lands and causing much confusion to owners of homes and properties they cross or displace. Many are not aware of the impact this corridor will have on local properties. 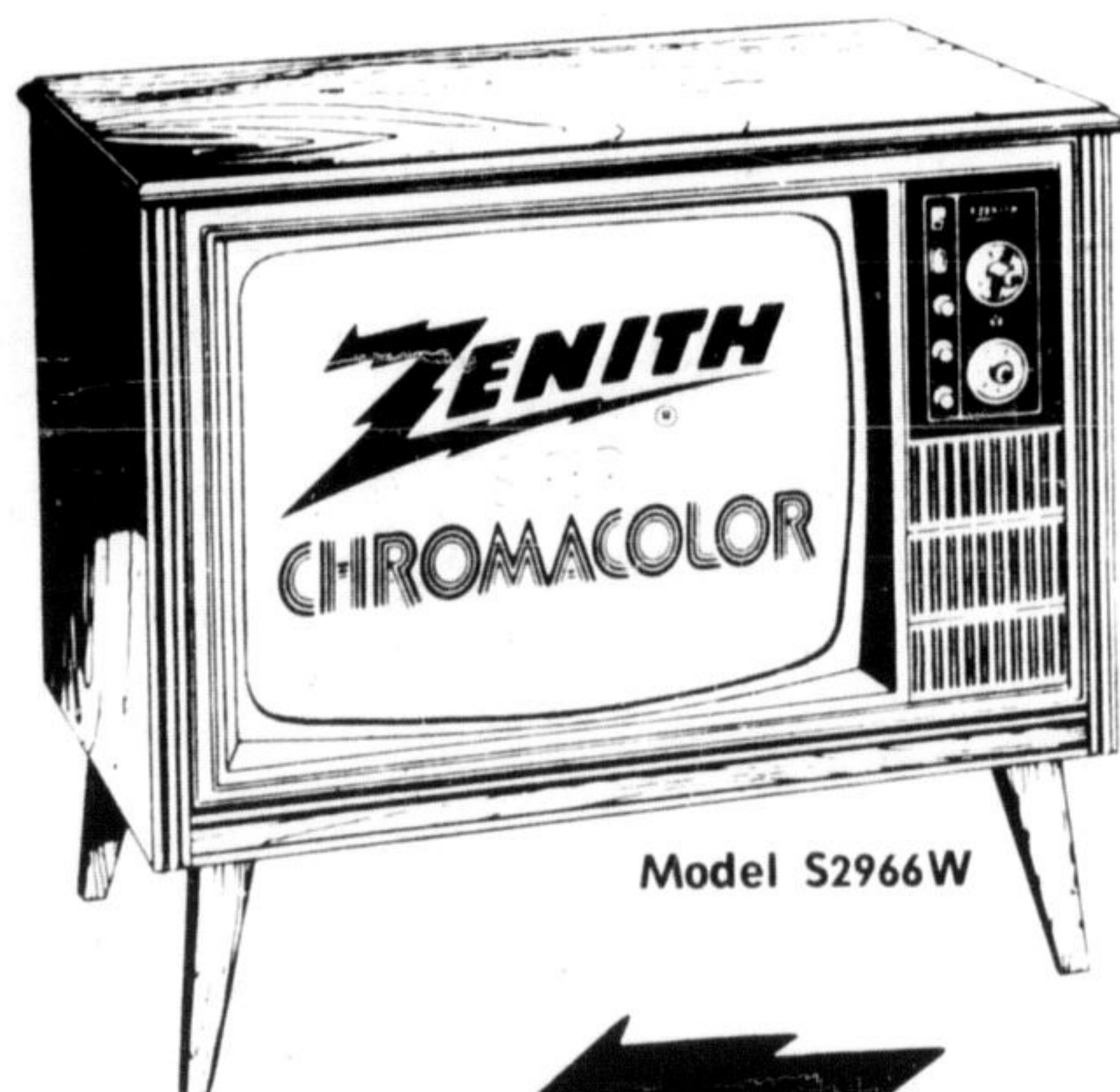
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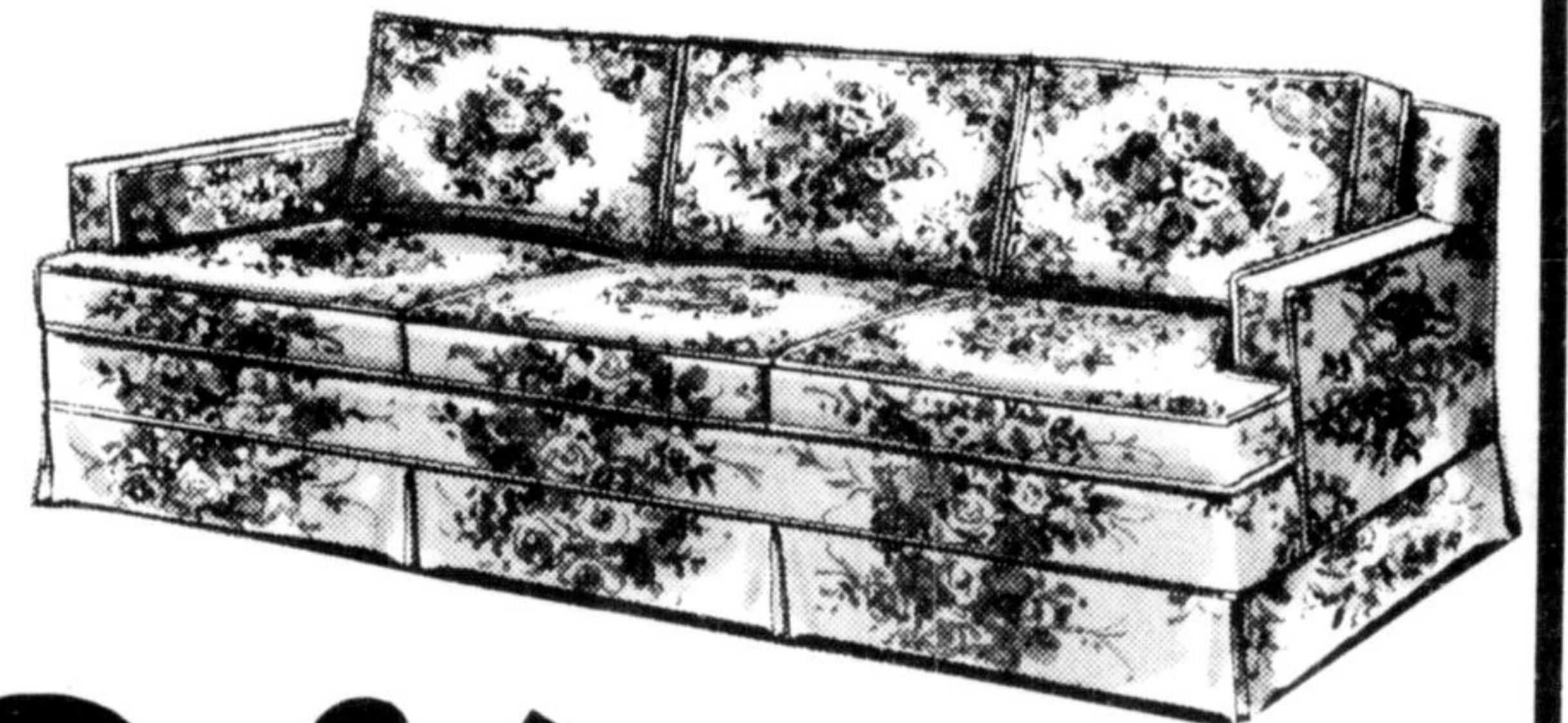
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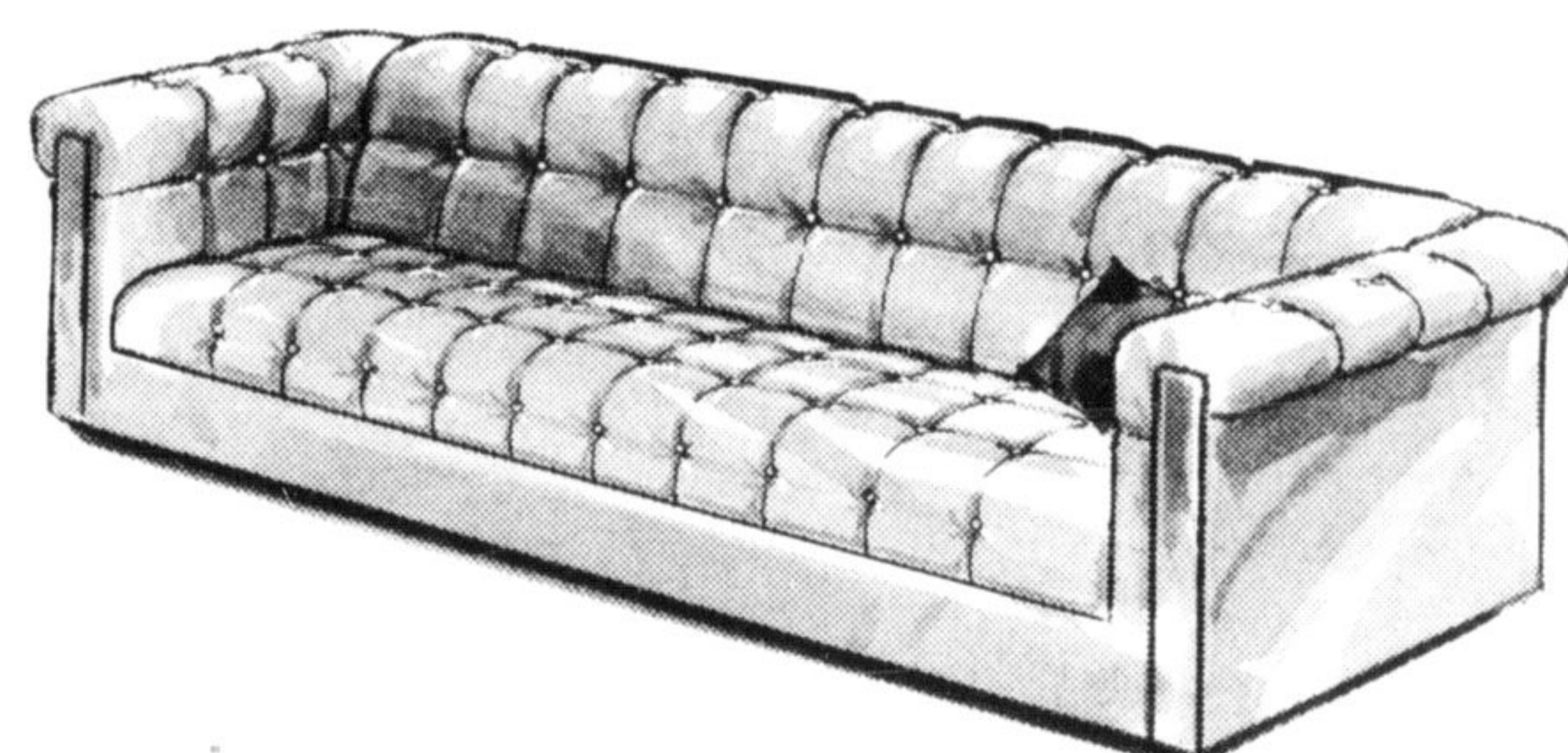
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
