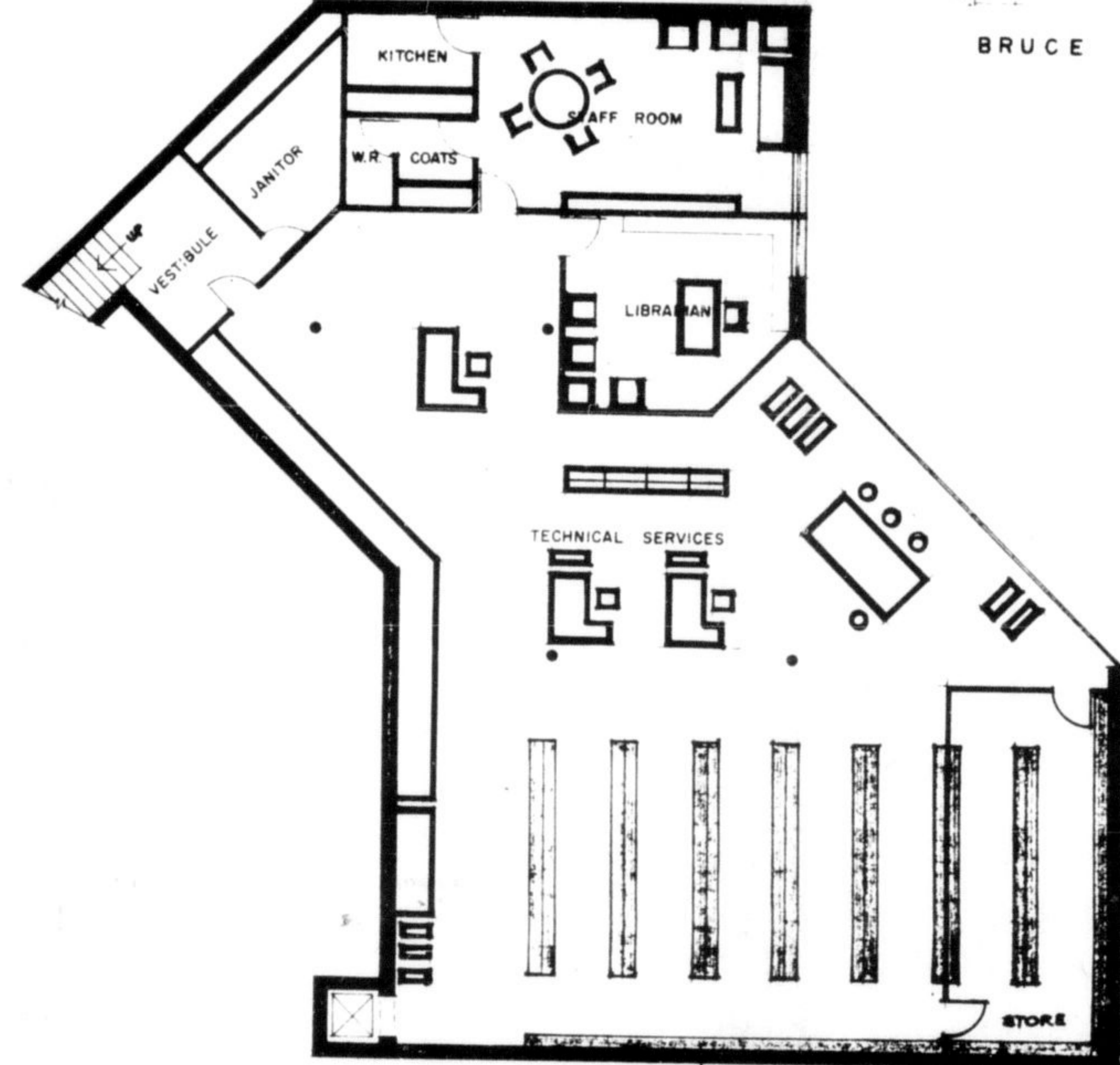

## Escarpment commission locates in Georgetown

Jim Snow, MPP for Halton East and Minister of Government Services, announced today that leased premises have now been obtained in Georgetown for use by the Niagara Escarpment Commission, established under an Act passed by the Legislature last June.

The 17-member Commission, under the chairmanship of George R. McCague, former Mayor of Alliston, will establish its offices on Dec. 1 at 232 Guelph St., Georgetown, to determine the use, co-ordinate purchases, and generally provide for the maintenance of the Niagara Escarpment and land in its vicinity as a continuous natural environment.

The office premises, comprising the whole of the second floor and part of the basement, and totalling approximately 8,600 sq. ft. of space, have been leased from Colossus Development Corporation which owns and occupies the building.

Small sub-offices will also be established in the vicinity of Grimsby and Collingwood to serve the residents of the southerly and northerly extremities of the Escarpment area.

Mr. Snow said that the Georgetown location is a logical choice for the Commission's main operations, being centrally situated to the perimeters of the Escarpment area, extending between the Niagara and Bruce Peninsulas.

The committee will include 17 people including the chairman. Eight will be chosen from the eight counties and regions along the escarpment. Each of those eight will be chosen by the province from a list of three members of county or regional governments submitted by county or regional councils.

In Halton Mrs. Anne MacArthur, outgoing Burlington Reeve Les Preston and Halton Hills regional councillor Len Cox have been nominated.

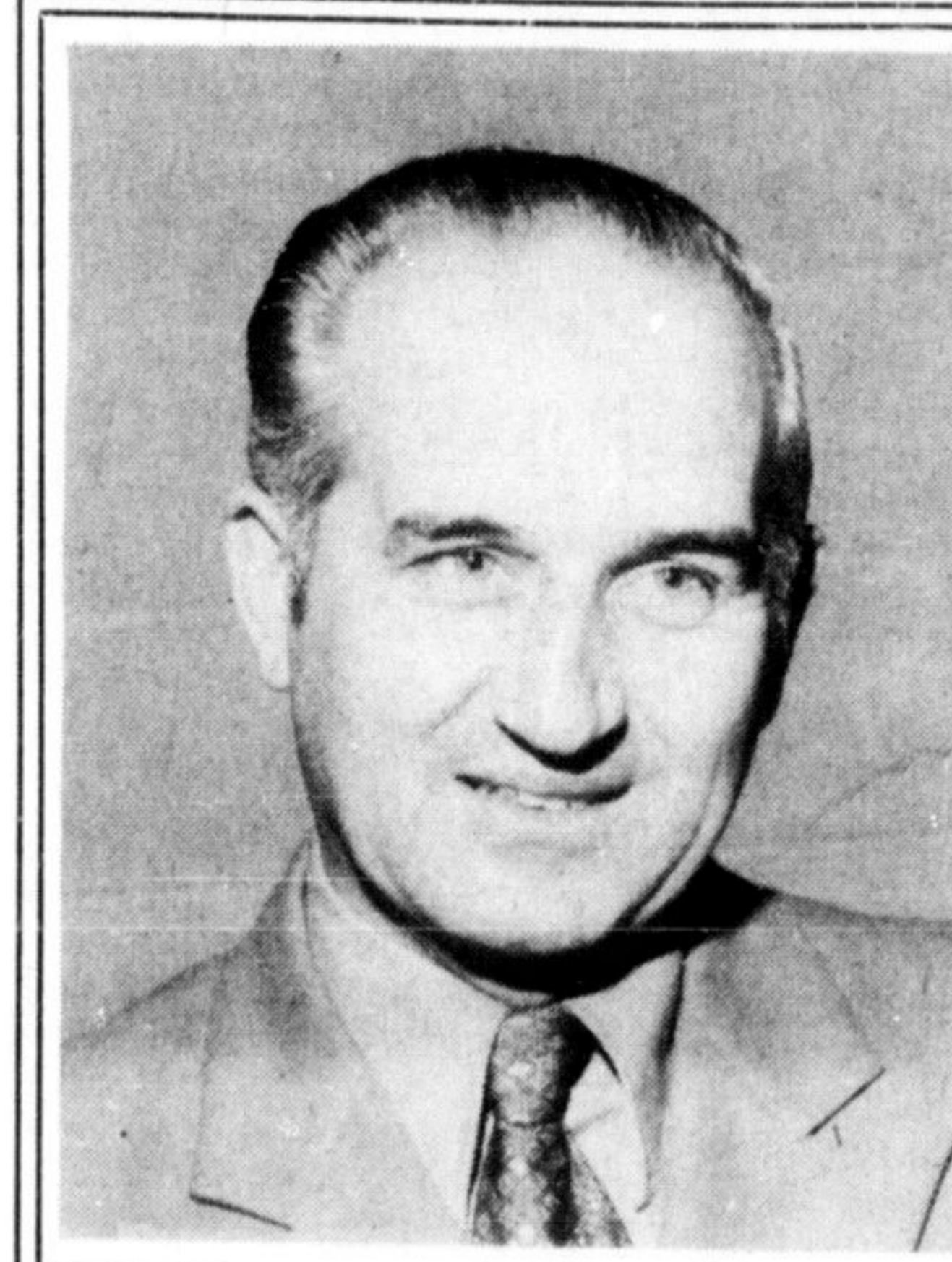
The province will appoint eight other members to provide a balance on the commission. The commission will develop an official plan for the escarpment.

## Building permit boom continues

Building in Esquering continues to boom, with a total of \$547,426 in permits issued during September.

The total was boosted by a \$250,000 for a clubhouse for Acton Legion, to be built on Lot 28, Con. 2, and a \$25,000 addition to Murt Allison Equipment Co., on Lot 24, Con. 8.

Three barns The gradual urbanizing of Esquering township is reflected in only three barn permits issued last month. A permit for a barn, valued at \$15,000 was issued to Robert Lawson Lot 10, Con. 5, a farm shed permit valued at \$28,000 was issued to Fred Ruddell, Lot 15, Con. 5, and a barn permit valued at \$2,000 was issued to Donald Schrader Lot 16, Con. 1.

The remainder of the permits were residential.
