

The former W. E. Breckon farm, behind the Lely Farm Machinery plant in Burlington was the site of this year's Halton County Plowing Match. Farmers from across Ontario were invited to plow the same land that had made Bill Breckon world wheat king in 1957. The event was sparsely attended.

Plowing competitions were divided into nine categories with an additional competition for horseshoe pitchers.

Cecil Wells, driving a team of Belgian horses and Stan May, driving Percherons, were the only entries in the jointer plow competitions. Wells, from Paris, won the \$30 first place prize money with \$20 going to May, of Hornby. Judges Win Timbers, York County, and Alf Brunton from Simcoe County praised both men on a fine

Two entries

There were only two entries in the Tractors in Sod - Open Split competition with Keith Robinson, Cooksville, winning \$30 for first place. Georgetown's Keith Leslie took \$20 home.

Oakville's Harley Pickering won his first of two top finishes in the Open Mounted Plows - Two or More Furrows Open Split winning \$30 and edging out Norval's John Wilson. They were the only entries.


Four boys between 12 and 18 vied for the Open Mounted Plows contest for Halton residents only. Wayne May of Hornby won top prize, an \$18 silver waiter and \$20 cash. Milton's Barry Ellsmere won second place \$25 with youngest plowman Danny Goulah of Oakville earning third for \$20 earning \$15.

Silver tray lace finish among four entrants in the Tractors in Sod competition with Bert Perriman, Ayr, finishing econd and his brother Les, with Burlington's Murray Breckon finishing fourth. Prizes were a \$20 silver tray and \$20 cash for the winner and \$25, \$20 and 15 respectively.

Tractors in Sod with Three or More Furrows (14 inch plows) was won by Howard Dunk of Guelph, who won a \$20 silver tray and \$20 cash by beating out his son Bruce. Bruce won \$25 for his second place show with Norm Love racking up \$20 for a third place finish.

Tractor Utility Class was won by Harley Pickering, the big winner from Oakville. He earned \$20, beating out Burlington's Murray Breckon, John Wilson of Norval and Dwight May of Hornby who won \$16, \$14 and \$12 respectively.



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
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TOSSING TO VICTORY, Acton's Dave Robertson
