

with Indian men. The women feel they should be allowed to keep their reserves and customs, much as other nations have their homeland. Mrs. Johnson was thanked


by Mrs. Jameson and presented with a gift. She also thanked the women of Nelson branch who acted as hostesses for the afternoon, serving tea and sweets.


