

Must justify job

EMO is under the gun again

Emergency Measures Co-ordinator for Halton County Bill McCreary will be asked to justify his job. The EMO function is one that has often been questioned and frequently attacked in recent years.

At a meeting of the Administration and Finance Committee of Halton Regional Council, Wednesday, McCreary asked the committee to endorse a resolution asking the federal government to increase its grants for EMO purposes by seven per cent a year rather than implementing the 50 per cent cut in funds announced several weeks ago.

Currently Halton EMO operates on a budget of \$19,550 of which the federal government pays 75 per cent, the province pays 15 per cent and municipalities pay 10 per cent.

More information Members of the committee asked for more information before they supported a request for funding. "I really don't know much about EMO and I don't know you. You'll have to convince me if you can," Oakville Councillor MacLean Anderson said.

Anderson said he wanted to know why the federal government wanted to cut the budget. "I guess if you can assume anything you can assume EMO hasn't done anything for a long time. I understand the county used to have a co-ordinator who did nothing but show up for county parties."

Burlington Mayor George Harrington wasn't convinced of the value of such a department. "The only time we could have used the service is when we had an ice storm and power was cut off in Burlington a couple of years ago. We couldn't find the job and ended up doing the job ourselves."

Works hard Regional Chairman Allan Masson suggested there had been trouble with some previous co-ordinators but noted McCreary was picking up the pieces and "busting his butt trying to do a good job."

McCreary gave a brief explanation of EMO. He noted peacetime emergency plans were formulated and these plans would be helpful in time of crisis.

He noted the function has changed from what was primarily a wartime function to a peacetime role.

Organize land division body

A nine man committee should be responsible for all land separations in Halton Region, according to the Administration and Finance Committee of the Regional Council.

That committee is expected to have two names presented from each municipality at a meeting today (Wednesday). The committee would be composed of two members from each municipality and a chairman appointed by the region.

Members of the Planning Committee and the Finance and Administration Committee agreed the chairman should be a person with planning background and some of the members should also sit on committees of adjustment.

New System People seeking a separa-

tion of land will have to make application to the land separation committee which is a regional function under the terms of regional government.

The same people may have to make application to the local committees of adjustment if the separation they request does not meet all of the requirements of the zoning by-laws. The committee of adjustment will be required to make decisions on any and all requests for variances from the zoning by-laws.

Several committee members felt the chairman would almost have to be full time. Burlington Mayor George Harrington felt it would not be a full time job and the chairman should receive a per diem pay.

New melting furnace at Pigment, Chemical

A new zinc melting furnace recently installed at United Pigment and Chemical Company, Milton zinc oxide plant has now commenced operation.

The 200 KW electric induction furnace melts 2,000 pound zinc slabs in a central location at the rate of 4,000 pounds per hour. The molten zinc is continuously pumped to graphite crucibles where boiling and vaporization takes place prior to oxidation.

The use of an electric induction furnace in this manner is a first in Canada, and the installation was designed to reduce uncontrolled

oxidation which previously occurred when the crucibles were hand charged with 56 pound zinc slabs.

The Ontario Department of Environmental Health, Ontario Hydro, zinc supplier Cominco Ltd., and the furnace manufacturer, Ajax Magnathermic, co-operated with Pigment and Chemical in establishing the system.

Permits up \$2,000,000 on '74 total

Building permits issued in Nassagaweya Township this year indicate the value of construction this year to date will surpass the similar period of time last year by close to \$2,000,000.

One hundred and nineteen permits have been issued so far this year for a value of \$3,730,300—compared to 89 permits valued at \$1,751,500 last year.

In October, 17 permits were issued for work valued at \$341,800. Permits for seven new homes, four residential additions or alterations and four private garages were taken out in addition to two agricultural buildings.
