Metrication lesson

for teachers, parents

A Metric Workshop conducted by Mr. McGuigan, teacher at J. M. Denyes Public School and Mr. Pravaca, Halton County mathematics consultant, will be held Nov. 20 at the school.

Groups will be formed to measure objects and liquids according to the metric system, soon to be adopted as our form of measurement.

Presently 90 percent of all countries in the world are using metric units and the anomalous use of imperial units by Canada and the United States places North America on an economic is-

land in certain industries, such as the automobile industry.

Easier system

The metric system is easier to use than the imperial system. That is, conversion from one metric unit to another involves only a change in the position of the decimal point.

The metric units are presently a part of the language of science and medicine and the simultaneous retention of imperial and metric units incurs increasingly greater expense each year, it is reported.

Modelling, chess, James Bay topics

The hydro project is now underway and as a result two court cases have developed. One was initiated by the Indians in protest of the ruination of their environment, and the other against Premier Bourassa con-

cerning the distribution of a book of James Bay propaganda while the former case was still before the judge. Mrs. Beaton will show pictures taken in the James Bay area and will relate some of the things she heard and observed during the Indian court case.

Thursday afternoon the last three films in the series of five put out by the Royal Bank on proper budgeting and management of your money will be shown.
