Around the shield is an oak leaf cluster probably representative of the White Oaks for which the south of the county was famous. Above the crest stands a sheaf of wheat representing agriculture in the county in general.

The crest which crept into the picture mysteriously featured different symbols. Upper left was a maple leaf, upper right a sheaf of wheat, lower left a walking plow and lower right a large oak tree. Above the shield is a lion with a broken lance.

Erla Brittain believes many new things could be incorporated into the region's crest because Halton has changed from the agricultural county is once was. She suggests a horse might be appropriate to designate Nassagaweya, famous for the Mohawk Raceway, for instance.
