**Top ranked Bulldogs humiliate opposition**

Milton Community Credit Union Bulldogs strengthened their hold on first place in the Major Pee Wee loop of the Tri-county as they made a sweep of three games this week.

Bulldogs trounced Burlington 5-0 last Tuesday, crushed Guelph 9-0 in Milton Saturday and walloped hometown Oakville 7-1 Sunday.

Bulldog captain Steve Blair continued to pace the team in Burlington with three goals while defenceman John Loe-

prich added the other two. Duane Stark drew a pair of assists with singles distributed among Mike Murray, Ian Wanless, Loeprich and Norm Flemington. Blair paced the home-owners with four goals and a pair of assists against Guelph. Wanless had a good night, notching two goals and two assists.

Single goals were recorded by Murray, Flemington and Rick Aselton. Stark, Loeprich, Aselton, Doug Dorsey and Bob Benton registered assists.

Blair went on another rampage in Oakville, firing five goals and assisting on another. Single scorers were Stark and Dorsey.

**Champoux, Benton lead Docs and Dents**

Rick Champoux turned in a two goal performance in Burlington while Scott Barnes picked up three assists.

Don Riding's opening goal at the four minute mark of the game was followed by a Burlington equalizer 10 minutes later.

Dean Swance gave Milton the lead early in the second period, paving the way for Champoux' goal. Burlington narrowed the gap to 3-2 five

minutes later but another tally by Champoux put the game in the bag midway through the third.

Benton hat trick Docs and Dents played one of their best games of the year Sunday in Oakville with Paul Benton picking up a hat trick.

Coach Caputo was ejected from the hard-fought contest when he attempted to help an injured player from the ice.

Benton put Milton's first counter on the board with 40 seconds gone in the game. Oakville equalized at the midway point.

Benton chucked in the winner at 5:40 of the third stanza after a scoreless second period. Champoux and Eaves collected assists.

Benton completed his hat trick 30 seconds before the final whistle, scoring into an empty Oakville net.

Scott Barnes and Doug Riding played strong games on defense and, when called on, Derek Neeldans made key saves in the Milton goal.

Docs and Dents came out on the losing end of a 3-2 exhibition game against Brampton in Milton Saturday afternoon.

We suppose some of you are wondering if the Sportsmen of Ontario are interested in environmental problems facing the world today. The answer is—we are very interested and are trying to help do something about them.

As you probably know the Federation of Anglers and Hunters works very closely with the Ministry of Natural Resources. Appointed representatives from various clubs in the province spend days every year trying to iron out or find a solution to some of the major problems.

Appointed members receive no money for their time or work.

We at the Halton Sportsmen's Association strongly feel there is no one more capable of dealing with such problems as water pollution, garbage disposal, etc. than the sportsman who spends a great deal of time out of doors, walking over, seeing and smelling problems arising from sanitary land fills, etc.

Of course, many segments of industry and government are concerned over the pollution problem, but unfortunately, most of these appointees are businessmen, real estate salesmen, lawyers and other professionals whose knowledge of nature is limited to what they have seen, possibly as they drive to the cottage or take the family to a park for a Sunday afternoon outing.

For years sportsmen have dreamed of pulling some good fish from the 12 Mile Creek again. Last month dream came true as the run of Coho salmon came up the 12 Mile as far as the dam at Lowville.

Fishermen have been getting good catches at Lowville, Zimmerman and some side streams. Zimmerman's Larry Campbell, George Robertson from Kilbride, Lowville's Jim Coulson, Don Kearney, Jim Smith and Cliff Barnes, just to name a few, have landed some beautiful fish.

This kind of fishing didn't just happen. It took years of work to clean up the stream

and kill the lamprey eel. The Halton Sportsmen are proud to say they had a hand in when the "12" was being treated for lamprey a few years ago. The Department of Natural Resources made their headquarters at the club and worked from there.
