Gary Johnson started the Brampton squad off with three minutes past in the game. Alex Ovenden replied for the Milton crew from Rod Gooding and Brent Hoey only two minutes later.

Gooding put Flyers one up in the closing minutes of the period with a tally from Hoey and Ovenden.

Kim Crossman tied the count with less than a minute

gone in the second period but Rick Bridgman was able to score the winning counter at the 14 minute mark from Jeff Lockridge and Ron Twiss.

Harold Merry chucked in the insurance goal at 18:25 of the period from Ray Love and Reid Neilsen.

Outplay
Milton outplayed their opponents in the final period doing everything but notching their fifth goal.

Doug Wetherall handled the Flyer nets as Brampton edged the visitors 12-11 in minor penalties.

Love leads
After edging the Dundas Blues 5-4 the previous Sunday Ray Love led the Flyers to a substantial 10-7 win Friday. Love recorded a hat trick while teammates Jeff Lockridge and Rod Gooding chipped in a pair of counters.

Gooding and Lockridge conceded they were "just lucky." Love attributed the win to a "good all round effort" by the team and mentioned the club was on a five game win streak as of the Friday night game.

We mentioned something about wanting to list various rules from week to week, so, here we go with the first one—taken from the Official Curling Rule Book.

"The skip shall have the exclusive direction and control of the game for his rink, and may play last stone, or any position he pleases, but shall not be allowed to change his position when that has been fixed. When his turn to play comes he shall select one of his players to act as skip in his place and take the position of an ordinary player.

"No other player may act as skip except the one so designated at the start of the match. The skip may return to the tee for a brief consultation with the acting skip. Any consultation or discussion by the skip, other than with his vice skip, shall not be conducted in or behind the rings."
