queries concerning sewers, roads, garbage or other functions carried on by the department.

Mr. McKerr said his staff would be able to refer matters to the region if the town staff couldn't handle them or felt the region should be doing

the particular job. Both Oakville and Burlington will continue to plow and maintain roads in North Oakville and North Burlington until April. Both municipalities will charge Milton for the services rendered.

Parks Recreation Department will be one of the municipal departments most affected by regional government. Overnight the population served by that department will jump from about 9,000 to almost 18,000.

The department will inherit about 55 acres of developed parkland, bringing the town's total to 76.2 acres. Omagh, Henderson and Boyne parks now in Oakville will be included in Milton along with Campbellville, Brookville and Moffat parks. All the parks have ball diamonds and the Boyne has a community centre as well.

Drumquin and Pine Ridge Parks in Oakville will fall within Milton's boundaries but a board of arbitrators decision has ruled that Oakville will retain control of both those parks. Milton council will likely oppose that decision when a formal report is filed. That report isn't expected until next summer.

Wants park Milton Recreation Director Bob Small in an interview explained why he felt these parks should be controlled by Milton. He notes the 115 acre Drumquin park would bring the town's parkland-pop-ulation ratio almost up to what is specified in the official plan. The official plan calls for 10 park acres per 1,000 people.

Small notes the park would help round out the town's park system. He noted there is currently no park in Milton that provides nature trails, a site for day camps and a place to snowmobile.

Oakville Mayor Harry Barrett claims the park should stay under Oakville control because it was purchased by the Town of Oakville. He notes that 96 per cent of the money came from the southern portion of the town.


