John Volpe scored a hat trick Monday to help the Milton Mustangs to win over a Beamsville High School team. The final score was 7-1 for the Mustangs.

Wade Bekar opened the scoring for Milton just as the teams were warming up at the 1.25 mark of the first period. He was assisted by John Volpe. Rick McTrach scored the second goal on a pass from Charlie Alcock at the 3.30 mark.

Bekar scored the third with Tony Pedulla receiving an assist. Three in a row Volpe scored the next three. They were all netted as Volpe fired from the side and caught an unprotected corner of the goal. On the first Steve McCann assisted, on the second Bekar and Mark Grenke, and on the third the pass was from Bob Prestidge.

Just seconds before the game ended Mark Grenke received the puck from the draw and fired it past the goalie from the blue line for the seventh Milton goal.

Beamsville scored their only goal at 10.15 of the last period. The score when this goal was scored was 6-1 and then Grenke scored his goal.

Coach Leonard commented that "the boys played well considering they hadn't had a good practise since before Christmas."

The team has a return game in Beamsville next Thursday. They begin regular games again today (Wednesday) in the East Halton County High School hockey league.

Out buildings Besides the artist's studio on the property there is a small guest house, a utility shop and a double garage in board and batten construction. A root cellar constructed of field stone with logs holding up the earth ceiling is collapsed, only the remnants remaining.

The house is presently heated with electricity. Costly this was an error in judgment by former owners. A log house is not constructed to accommodate standard insulation and much heat loss results. John will eventually put in a furnace, but as this necessitates digging a basement, he will heat with stoves and the fireplace in the meantime.

Five years ago when the Pirries first took ownership there was no water or plumbing and only the crudest electrical wiring. They have made remarkable strides in their renovating since that time. Their determination to restore the house with authentic materials will provide them with a unique home and Halton County with an invaluable landmark.

Mrs. L. Andrews showed the provincial award film, "Women in Action in the Community". Mrs. M. Collins gave a Consumer's Magazine summary.

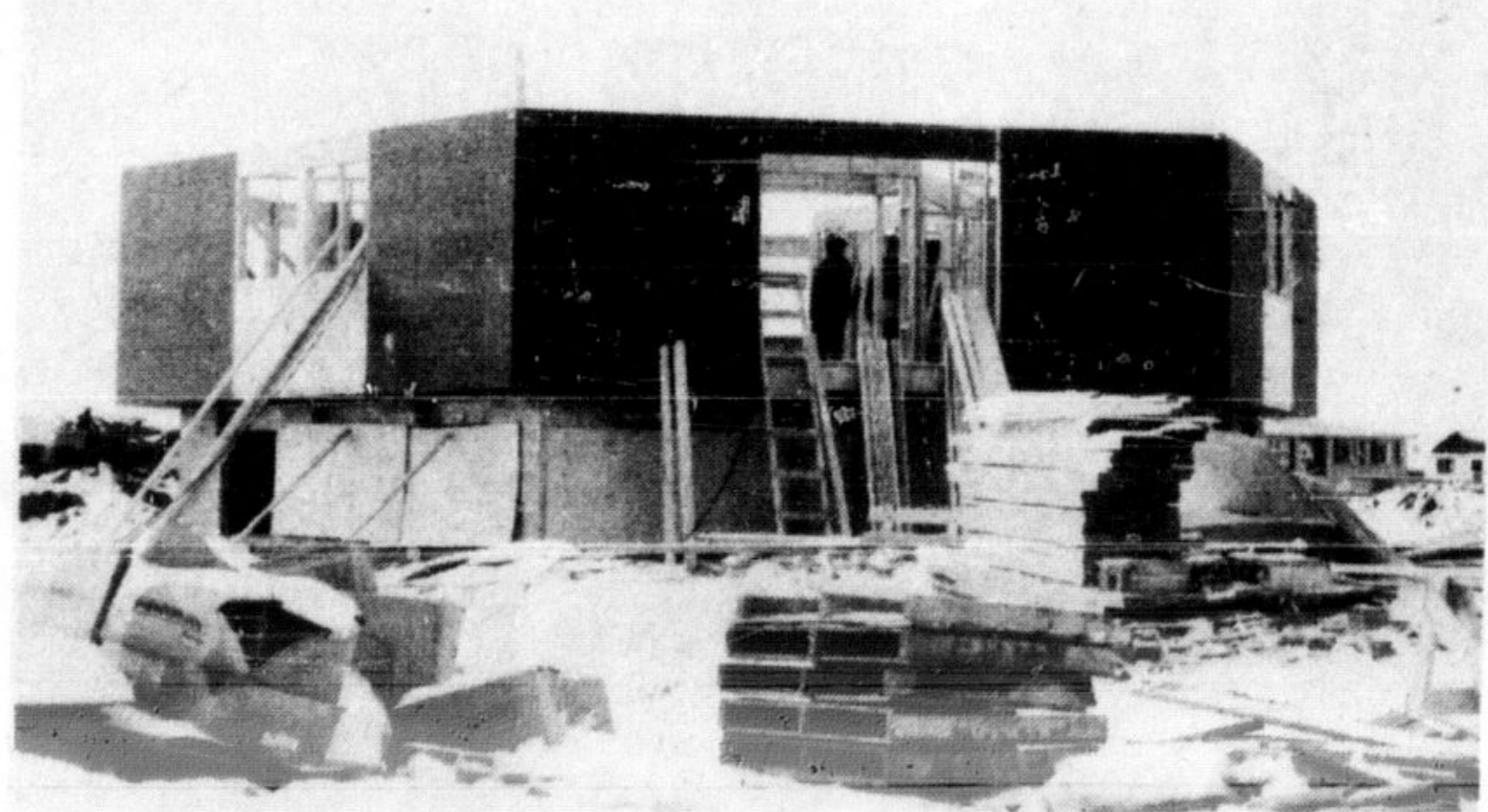
