She has previously raced for England and Jamaica but feels sentimental about having won the gold medal for her new country. Jamaican by birth, Yvonne will become a Canadian citizen in May. Her family moved to England from Jamaica in 1951.

In public and high school she placed first in track and field events in inter-school competitions. In 1966 she joined the Stratford Athletic Club in England and competed in many county competitions in Europe, capturing top awards.

During the summer of 1967 her family moved to Montreal and it was then Yvonne made the choice between school and track. She remained England and was chosen to compete in the Centennial International Track and Field Meet in Ottawa and Toronto. She took a first and second

In 1968 she moved to Montreal to be with her family. The family moved to Milton in 1970.

In Canada she has competed in games in Ireland, Halifax, Winnipeg Edmonton, Victoria, Vancouver and the Commonwealth Games in Edinburgh Scotland. She also competed in the 1972 Olympics.


### Negotiate for salaries
