As of December, 1973 over half the population of Milton belonged to the Milton Public Library, with new registrations totalling 1,101.

There were 72,906 books and magazines circulated by the library during the year, 174 of these having been requested from Interloan. If the book you desire is not in stock, librarian Mrs. Shelagh Conway will secure it for you from the Inter-library Loan Service. Some very rare books are located this way from all across Canada.

Milton Library has a good collection of records to loan. There were 289 new records added in 1973, bringing the

Film loans were particularly high, exceeding 1972 by 100 per cent. Private individuals, clubs and schools can borrow films, projectors and screens, and this year 441 loans were made. At present the space is limited for film storage and most requests are filled through South Central Regional Library System.

Storytime Children's programs are well attended with a total of 611 taking part last year. Every Tuesday morning from 10.30 to 11 those four and five years old attend storytime. One Saturday a month a film is shown. Canadian Brass provided a musical concert in the library.




