

During the discussion Brown apologized for inadvertently giving Foster what appeared to be misleading information. Foster apologized for becoming angry at secretaries in the regional offices and for what he referred to as giving them a hard time. The printing equipment was reported as costing \$24,000 and that was part of \$75,000 spent by Masson without council's knowledge. The action was taken with the province's approval and Mas-

son apparently was within his legal rights. Clerk Garfield Brown said the press report estimating the cost at \$24,000 was incorrect. He did not indicate what the correct figure was. Foster had said \$24,000 was an outrageous


