



URGES SHOPPING PLAN

Dear Sir As a fairly new resident of the town of Milton I am happy here. I think it's a great place to live, with the exception of the shopping. The clerks are very pleasant and helpful as a general rule and it's nice to a small town atmosphere. However that's a far cry from making up for the poor selections and lack of stock in most stores. I don't mind paying slightly higher prices if I can get what I want. I am so tired of making do with substitutes. Frequently I hear "We'll order it for you..." If I want to order something Eaton's or Simpson's will deliver it to my door the next day. It seems the only solution is to join the many, many residents of Milton who drive to Burlington and Brampton to shop.

This letter is not meant to blindly criticize, but to be constructive.

To you merchants of Milton-Don't put yourselves out of business...The writing is on the wall... If you don't stock your shelves, spruce up your stores and be competitive Milton will follow other towns and become a "ghost downtown". We the newcomers are not foolish. If we can get what we want here, we'll shop here, and only go to the plazas as an outing.

To you Madame Mayor...you stated we need better shopping, you are definitely right. I urge you to put it to the merchants, develop an overall plan, make downtown Milton a place where people can walk and browse. Where we can be proud to say "That's my town". If the merchants cannot pull together and co-operate in the manner that plazas do, then the only solution is to encourage the development of a modern indoor mall for Milton.

RAPS H.R.C.A.

Dear Mr. Editor:

We couldn't believe our eyes when we read in last week's Champion that the H.R.C.A. had turned down the Town of Milton's offer of a year's free accommodation in the former Nassagaweya Township Hall and have opted instead to rent offices in Trafalgar Square at the cost of \$26,149. The reasons given for the decision were not valid as far as we are concerned. What kind of accommodation does H.R.C.A. need that would call for over \$23,000 in renovations to a building that is only seven years old?

If this is to be only temporary accommodation, what is the necessity of permanent partitions, drop ceilings and new flooring. What kind of equipment does H.R.C.A. have that needs \$3,200 in wiring, fixtures and telephone outlets or were the township employees using oil lamps and pony express. As far as air conditioning is concerned, this is a luxury not a necessity.

As far as it being too far to travel, we are sure that most people out here would be glad to be within a 15 minute drive of their

work. If a regional building is built at Kelso will that be any more convenient than Brookville which is on the Guelph Line and is easily accessible from Highway 401. What angers us the most is that this is only

meant to be temporary accommodation. Surely the H.R.C.A. and its staff could put themselves out until they have a regional building rather than subject Halton taxpayers to yet another unnecessary expense and make use of a which will otherwise remain empty. (If H.R.C.A. thinks it is inconvenient what other government department won't use the same excuse.)

This seems like the final straw in the week by week reporting of the spiralling costs of Regional Government. Where every level and department of that government seem to be vying with each other to see who can rip off the taxpayer for the biggest amount in the matter of staff, accommodation and equipment. It is no wonder that ratepayer associations are forming all over Halton Region. When the mill rate is finally set, the government may find that we taxpayers are not about to be stuck with the bill for the uncontrolled extravagances of a form of government that was foisted on us without so much as a vote. Bigger is seldom better and never

cheaper. Our thanks to Councillor Jim Watson for his concern. It is nice to know there are still a few of our elected officials who give the taxpayers a thought.
