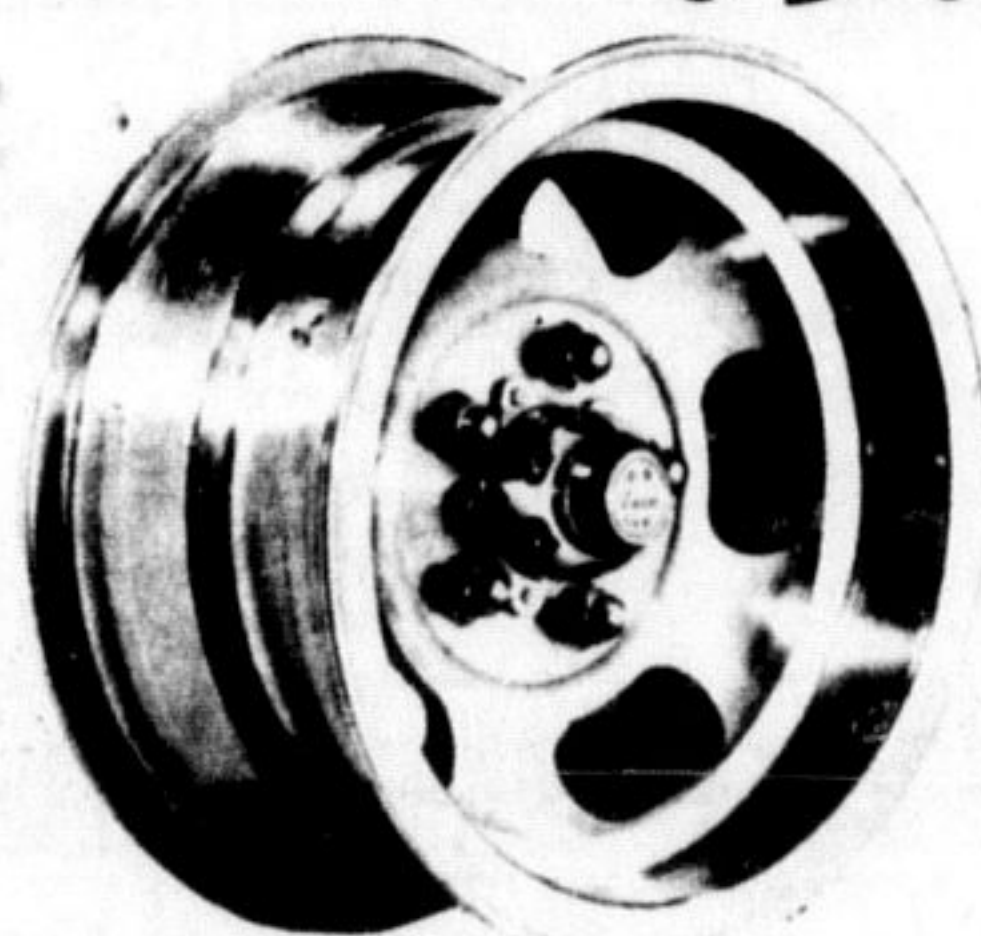
family will pay five dollars and families with three or more players will be required to pay six dollars.

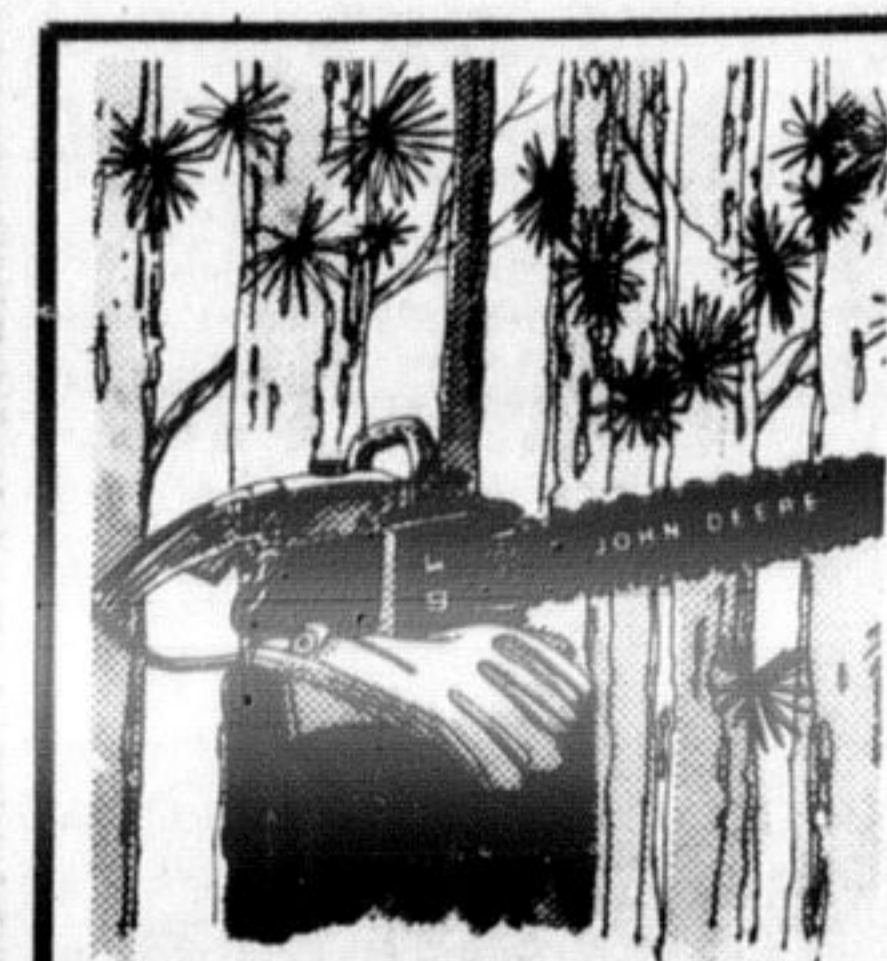
