

## Redevelopment committee to study town parking lots

A citizens committee studying redevelopment of the business core of Milton will include the management of parking lots as one of the matters that committee will discuss.

Milton Council's Community Services Committee agreed that committee should consider the eventual plans for the Mary St. lot not under construction and other parking lots in town.

Emmerson McCready, Chamber of Commerce president, appeared at the meeting Monday. He told the committee there didn't seem to be anyone particularly in charge of that function since the parking authority was abolished. Council has assumed that responsibility.

It was noted the regional police were hesitant about ticketing cars in the parking lot unless meters or some technical device was used.

Fancy paint suggested painting the common fence at the back of the parking lot on the town's side. He noted a contest could be held and murals painted in four foot strips.

McCready is a member of the urban core redevelopment committee. He, along with Ken Easley, Mike Crucifix, Liz Frame and one unnamed member will sit on

the committee once it is formed.

McCready noted a trailer and a car had been parked at the lot for four months in spite of attempts to have it moved. Mayor Anne MacArthur assured McCready the car and trailer would be moved soon.

Save prime space  
The committee discussed allocating secondary space for employee parking and reserving prime spots for customers.

## Seek volunteers for recycling program

Interested in a recycling program for Milton?

Milton Council's administration committee recommended Monday that council look for volunteers to organize a recycling program similar to SPIN, which has been operating in Nassagaweya for several years.

Councillor Jim Watson revealed the Nassagaweya group would like to see the program of recycling expanded into the urban area of town. SPIN operates a monthly depot for glass, cans and paper where residents who have separated their garbage can go and deposit it for recycling. The

committee agreed to recommend that council advertise for volunteers.

## Credit Union opens Oakville branch office

Halton Community Credit Union opened its first branch office in Oakville Saturday with a ribbon-cutting ceremony, speeches, open house and wine and cheese to celebrate the occasion.

The Oakville office is at 338 Kerr St., in the centre of a growing business community, and credit union officials predict a bright future for the office. The group was formed 15 years ago in Milton as Holy Rosary Parish Credit Union, five years ago became Milton Community Credit Union, and this year expanded again to become a Halton-wide group.

A provincial charter permits the group to serve all of Halton except the Halton Hills area and anyone living or working in Milton, Oakville or Burlington is eligible for membership.

Manager Jules Frijters said Saturday the Milton operation has been very successful and has grown rapidly since it went community-wide just five years ago. He said the Oakville office was sure to prosper and once it is running smoothly, another office will be opened in the Burlington area.

Krantz chaired the brief ceremonies. President Ben Reiss said it was just eight months ago the credit union received approval to expand into the region of Halton and in the Oakville branch's first month, business had been good and "we are well on our way to our first million dollars in assets." The Oakville office has been open since March 15 and already has 350 members. He said he was confident HCCU had a good future in Oakville.

Directors Gordon Holmes, Harry Funk, Albert Schouten, Gus Tielemans and Charles Stiehl were also introduced, as were the Oakville office staff, manager Ron Neatham, Bianca Tino, Martin Best and Kathy Townsend.
