Chansonettes prepare for musicale



MILTON CHANSONETTES choir this week released its first record, a collection of the choir's most popular songs which was recorded at Holy Rosary Church in January. They will sing at the May Fest in Oakville April 30, at Shoppers' World in Brampton on May 10 and will hold their annual Spring Musicales at OSD auditorium on Sunday, April 28.

A sure sign of spring is the presentation of the Milton Chansonettes' annual Spring Musicales, sponsored by the University Women's Club of Milton and District.

The program this year will be held in the main auditorium of the Ontario School for the Deaf on Sunday, April 28 at 3 p.m.

The choir is directed by Judy Hunter and accompanied by Win Newell, Marnie and Ron Rand of Milton add guitar and bass to several selections on the program, and the Chansonettes trio composed of Lynne Brown, Sandra Pollen and June McCuaig will also be featured.
