Sports complex at Bronte Park

The home of the 1981 Canada Summer Games will be built near the Bronte Creek Provincial Park, Premier Bill Davis announced Wednesday in Toronto.

An Olympic-regulation swimming pool with a 10-metre diving tower will be built this year and an arena, gymnasium, indoor track, outdoor track and field facilities and athlete accommodation will follow in the next five years.

Total cost is yet unknown, but the pool is estimated at \$3.7 million.

Davis noted the sports complex will be used for national and provincial championships, school and community programs and for the development of coaches, judges, managers and sports administrators. Jim Snow, local MPP and Minister of

Government Services, said the centre will definitely not be used for professional sports and said Oakville was chosen as the site because of its "ideal geographic location to serve the largest number of people."

The exact site of the new construction has not been determined. It may be on land adjacent to the provincial park, but it will be chosen not to interfere with the park master plan, he said.

The two properties allowed in the restricting by-law are Mohawk Trailer Park at Campbellville and Milton Heights Camping Grounds on Town Line near the Heights.
