It was recommended to Halton Region Conservation Authority by Dr. MacAndrews of the Royal Ontario Museum that this study be carried out. He assured them there would be no environmental damage to the lake as a result.

The pollen preservation study will be conducted by Karen Hadden, a graduate student at York University, as part of her PhD thesis. Her findings will be on file with the authority.

Fifteen-year-old Stephen Spalding of Mississauga was among 22 persons who symbolized by water baptism their dedication to serve Jehovah God. The occasion was the semi-annual Circuit Assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses at Milton District High School on the weekend. Total immersion in water is an outward symbol that the individual has covenanted conditionally. According to a witness spokesman, this involves living a Christian life and becoming a literal witness of Jehovah God. During 1973 over 190,000 persons in the world took this step.

A crowd of 1,045 heard A. M. Didur, District overseer of Jehovah's witnesses in southern Ontario deliver the main address Sunday. The subject was, "Be confident of account depicting the coming warfare between God's heavenly forces and those opposed to his Divine rulership. Mr. Didur stated, "There is no question as to who will be victorious; the question is, will we benefit from Divine victory?"

The speaker encouraged his audience to demonstrate confidence in divine victory by preparing for it now. He cautioned against allowing the anxieties of life to affect this confidence and encouraged a diligent study of the scriptures.

The assembly coincided with a special distribution of the tract entitled "Government by God." The tract with God to serve him un- explains how soaring prices, dwindling food supplies, corruption and mismanage-

ment in governments and the general decline in the quality of life are all products of human government. The alternative, government by God is recommended. During the first ten days of May this tract will receive worldwide distribution. According to Mr.

Didur, this type of activity reaches many persons previously not contacted by the witnesses.

He continued, "Because of the limited time remaining and the vast work to be done, Jehovah's witnesses are concerned that all people

understand the choice before them and the consequences of their decision."

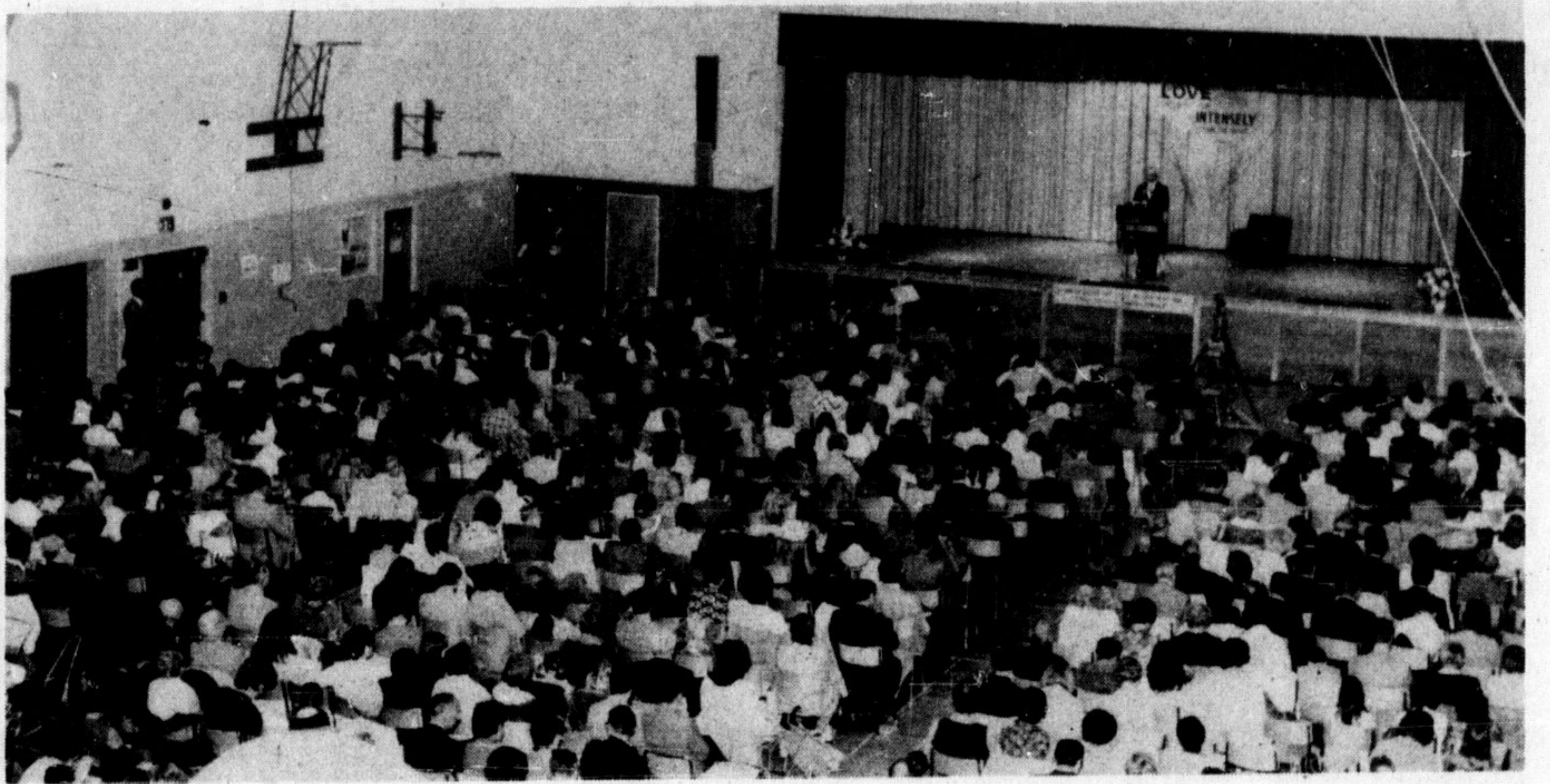
A ministry school was held Saturday, with over 800 attending. Many of the Witnesses from out of town stayed for meals at the high school.

Want all dogs, cats attend rabies clinic

By May 14, Dr. E.R. Earl hopes as many as possible of the dogs and cats in Halton will be vaccinated against rabies. Clinics, sponsored by the Animal Health Branch of the Department of Agriculture, began this morning (Wednesday) in Lowville and will continue at various locations in the county until next Tuesday.

Dr. Earl is head veterinarian at the Brampton District office of Animal Health, and notes most infection is present in foxes and skunks. Vaccination of family pets will act as a barrier between wild animals and the human population of the county, he said.

Since symptoms of rabies in either man or animal are generally fatal, anyone who has been bitten by or been in contact with a rabid animal must receive prompt treatment before these symptoms develop. Such treatment is sometimes painful.

Clinic dates The clinics are for dogs and cats only and will be held at the following locations:

Wednesday, May 8 from 1:30 to 7:30 p.m. at Central Arena, New St., in Burlington.

Thursday, May 9 at the Municipal Garage in Nassagaweya and the Orange Hall in Hornby from 10 a.m. to 12 noon; at the Arena Community Centre in Acton from 2 to 6 p.m., and the Municipal Garage in Georgetown from 3 to 7 p.m.
