The weather, unlike opening day, has been anything but kind for the fisherman. Cold, wet weather has delayed the season by at least three weeks.

Some of our far northern lakes still had ice on them last weekend. If you are planning a trip north it would be best to contact someone in the area.

The cold weather did not hamper the opening of pickelerel season in Southern Ontario however. The run of pickelerel in the Kawarthas was the best in years with many fish in the two to three pound class.

At the river in Lindsay many had their full catch by 11 o'clock and were on their way back to Toronto by noon.

The river seemed to be alive with fish. Most catches were made trolling slowly with a rapalla lure.

Bobaygeon and Fenelon Falls were also contacted by yours truly and the run in both places was spectacular—good news for the pickelerel fisherman in the Kawartha Lakes.

Steve Keene's "green rocks" seem to be working as he caught a five pound rainbow the opening day at Thornbury while fishing with Don Kearney, Lorne Lyons and Keith Andrews.

Ron, Don and Joe Marshall, Bill Praught, Jim McLain, Primo Rigo and Ed Adamson were fishing at Umpa in the Perth area and caught four lovely speckles. Don Marshall caught the most fish with Jim McLain pulling in the largest.

Bill Mountain fishing with his wife Gertie got a lovely pickelerel which should take the trophy this year.

Jim Smith is still right in there after the rainbow trophy with a nine pound, 10 ounce fish to his record already. Don Kearns also caught a beauty in the 12 Mile Creek.
