Campbellville seniors were subjected to a merciless trouncing by the Leaside Maple Leafs in Campbellville Sunday afternoon. The league leading Leaside squad thumped the locals 22-1 in what was probably the worst defeat in Campbellville baseball history.

Four Campbellville pitchers—Wayne Emms, Garnet Mitchell, Bill Dennis and Loris Faggion—all tried ineffectively to stop the Toronto sluggers.

Most effective of the village moundsmen was left fielder second baseman Faggion, who held the powerhouse to only one run in

two and a third innings. Emms was the game loser. Leaside's awesome display of power included a show of nine home runs—undoubtedly a record in Campbellville.

Included among the Maple Leaf round trippers were grand slam homers by Canning and Riverso.

The grand slammers hit two homers apiece with Smith, Scott, Knight and Osborne supplying the rest.

Ejected from the game in the fourth inning and replaced by right hander Tomerson. The reliever shut out the village team in five innings to earn the win.

Campbellville played without regular first baseman Ray Evans sitting out back problems, but it would have taken more than Evans to make up the difference of 21 runs.

Nine hits Campbellville batters logged nine hits but weren't able to make use of them. Bob

Biskup, Loris Faggion and Don Hearn each contributed two hits with Rick Mitchell, coach Ken Moore, Steve Smith and Rick Clement picking up one each.

The loss left the villagers with a record of 10 wins and six losses to give them a solid third place in the league. They are well ahead of fourth ranked Burlington but well back of Leaside and Oakville.

Campbellville plays in Mississauga Friday night and will be hosting Oakville at the Campbellville diamond 2:30 Sunday afternoon.

Wilson, Flyer coach announces Gooding

Milton Minor Hockey coach Dor Wilson will move up to coach the Junior "B" Flyers this year announced team owner Vern Gooding this week.

Wilson replaces Bob "Pie" Lee who has since moved to Michigan to supervise a senior hockey program and help to organize a junior program. "Pie" went to Michigan Tech University on a hockey scholarship several years ago.

Standout record Wilson comes to the Flyers with a standout record as coach of the Credit Union sponsored pee wees for five years, coach of the Milton Juvenile squad another year and has helped out with midget house league teams. The new coach had played three years with the old Milton Intermediate club preceded by a stint with the Acton Junior "C" team.

"Kids who've played for him will respect him," said Gooding after reviewing his new coach's record. "We feel he's ready—he deserves a chance."

Gooding noted Wilson had been a regular spectator at most of the Flyers home games this season. "I like the idea of a home town coach," continued the owner.

Retired pro Gooding has also secured the services of retired pros Pierre Pilote and Enio Scisizzi to act as advisors to the coaching staff of the local Junior "B"s.

This year's Flyers will play in a smaller league this season against clubs from Oakville, Burlington, Streetsville, Brampton and a new entry in the Central Junior "B" loop, Dixie. The Central league lost clubs from Preston, Hespeler and Dundas to other neighboring leagues.

Competing with the old Central teams this past season Milton ranked second in the regular season behind Oakville and nosing out Burlington, Streetsville and Brampton. Dundas and the Cambridge clubs were league doormats.

"This league is gonna be tough," concedes Gooding, "we're ready, though." "We'll be well represented."

Training camp Flyers open training camp early in September at the Kwanis arena in Burlington and will move to Milton when ice is ready in the Brown St. arena Sept. 15. Gooding has four practices in Burlington before he brings the club home.

When work is completed on the new Thompson Rd. arena the Flyers will move into it. Due to lack of services in the new

facility Flyers will be forced to open their season in the Brown St. ice palace.

Flyers will postpone their official home opener until they move into the new arena. Gooding anticipates having to play three or four games in the old rink.

In light of the revised junior hockey ruling raising the age of eligibility from 20 to 21 all last year Flyers will be able to play on this year's club.

Missing regulars Gooding will be missing some last year regulars when the season starts in October however. Defenceman Ron Twiss was claimed by the Junior "A" Peterborough Petes in the midget draft in the spring and captain Harry Merry will be attending Carleton University in the fall. Defenceman George Hood has been accepted into Queen's University and Pete Chuchmach has accepted a hockey scholarship at Cornell University in New York.

Gooding hopes to line up some pre season exhibition games with teams from Guelph, Markham and Elmira in late September before the season starts.

Stan Callard and Doug Twiss will be rejoining the Flyers as trainers.
