Programs provide jobs for students

Nine of the 20 experienceoriented summer employment programs sponsored by the Ontario government are operating in Halton.

Best known is SWEEP, Students Working in an Environmental Enhancement Program, which operates through the local conservation authority. The Head Start and Rural Playground projects, associated with the Milton Parks and Recreation Department, are part of a larger Youth in Action program designed to assist with community social

Two programs Two of the programs are mobile and travel across the province. Art Trek, teams of student artists conducting workshops, has already been to Milton. They brought charcoal, pastels, modelling clay, and macrame to the community centre in Rotary Park on Community Day, and worked with local would-be artists. The other travelling program is a community

historical and architectural inventory being collected throughout communities in the province. Thirteen students are recording descriptions, photographs and drawings of buildings with historical or architectural

importance. The Youth and the Law program, where students work day-to-day with local police forces is being con-tinued this year, with six students assisting the Halton

Four in Georgetown In Georgetown four students training in therapeutic recreation are working with the handicapped and the chronically ill as part of an Alternatives program geared to the leisure needs of Ontario agencies such as homes for the aged, day nurseries, formation and referral the operation.

Displays for the Ontario Museum Agricultural presently under construction near Kelso are being collected and catalogued at an agricultural ministry farm near Hawkestone with the help of several students.





Committee asks Board rethink Norval closing

Committee has asked the Halton Board of Education to "reconsider the closing of the Norval School" according to to the community at present chairman Ken Campbell.

The request came as one of the resolutions being considered in preparing a brief to over to the Board for safe submit to the Board of Education in an August meeting.

"In view of the urgency of the Norval situation our executive has decided to send the Norval resolution to the Board at once," the chairman

Campbell emphasized the all parents throughout Halton who view with alarm the high-handed actions of insensitive educational bureaucrats who run roughshod over the parents in imposimg their narrowminded view on the people of such a community.'

He maintained the Norval residents were upset because the decision to close the school was made by civil servants and then a strategy set in motion to make it possible. This involved, he said, bussing some of the students to other areas resulting in a drop in at-


