## Milton joins province in housing program

Milton Council became the first area in Halton Region to declare itself as a target area for the province's action housing program.

The resolution passed does not commit the town to any particular proposal but simply ensures the province the town is interested in having homes built in town under the provincial program. The program is geared to have approvals given early and housing provided at an affordable

The second original recommendation would have seen the 80 acres owned by Buildevco designated as a acity. potential OHAP target and would have provided approval in principle of the plan of subdivision for as many as 432 housing units.


Quick approvals

## Old brown mare still what she used to be

Yo Te Amo is a 25-year-old California-bred thoroughbred mare who became a mother last week for the seventh and last time. Her owner Tony promises this is the last time she will be bred and has called the young colt Yo Te's Last. He believes her to be one of the oldest mares in Canada to colt.

Because of the advanced age of the mare the colt must receive supplement feedings. Three times a day Tony prepares Similac, a human baby formula, and feeds it to the gangling-legged colt from a beer bottle with a nipple Older mares apparently do not have proper vitamins for the nourishment of the young. Lead poisoning

Tony raises and breeds for racing at Woodbine, Fort Erie and Greenwood. Since 1956 he has developed some winners on his 75 acre farm here. Yo Te Amo's first three offspring did well for Tony but lately his luck has run thin. Part of the trouble is believed to be lead poisoning caused by the young horses chewing on some painted doors in the barn. The condition causes soft bones and


