### Glen Eden ski rates increased

A 10 to 12 per cent increase in ski rates at the Glen Eden Ski Area will become effective this year. According to Halton Region Conservation Authority secretary-treasurer Max Hatherley, the budget has not been set up for next year but the increase should cover the basic costs of operating the ski area.

Individual rates for adult season memberships will now be \$85, a raise of \$10. Students are \$55 and Juniors \$45.

Family rates are \$85 for the first member, \$55 for the second member and \$20 for each additional member. The maximum rate per family is \$175. "The idea is to keep the rates low enough so the average individual can still afford to ski," Mr. Hatherley says.

Lessons The price of a season membership includes one ski season car pass and a Glen Eden Ski Area patch.

The price for adult ski lessons for the 1974-75 season is \$22 for eight lessons for a season membership holder and \$26 for eight lessons for a non-season membership holder. This is a raise of \$2 over last year.

Ski tow tickets for the area will be increased by 50 cents for adults, the amount now being \$3.50. Rates for children remain the same as last year at \$1.25.
