Tourney host Hornby nipped in semi-final

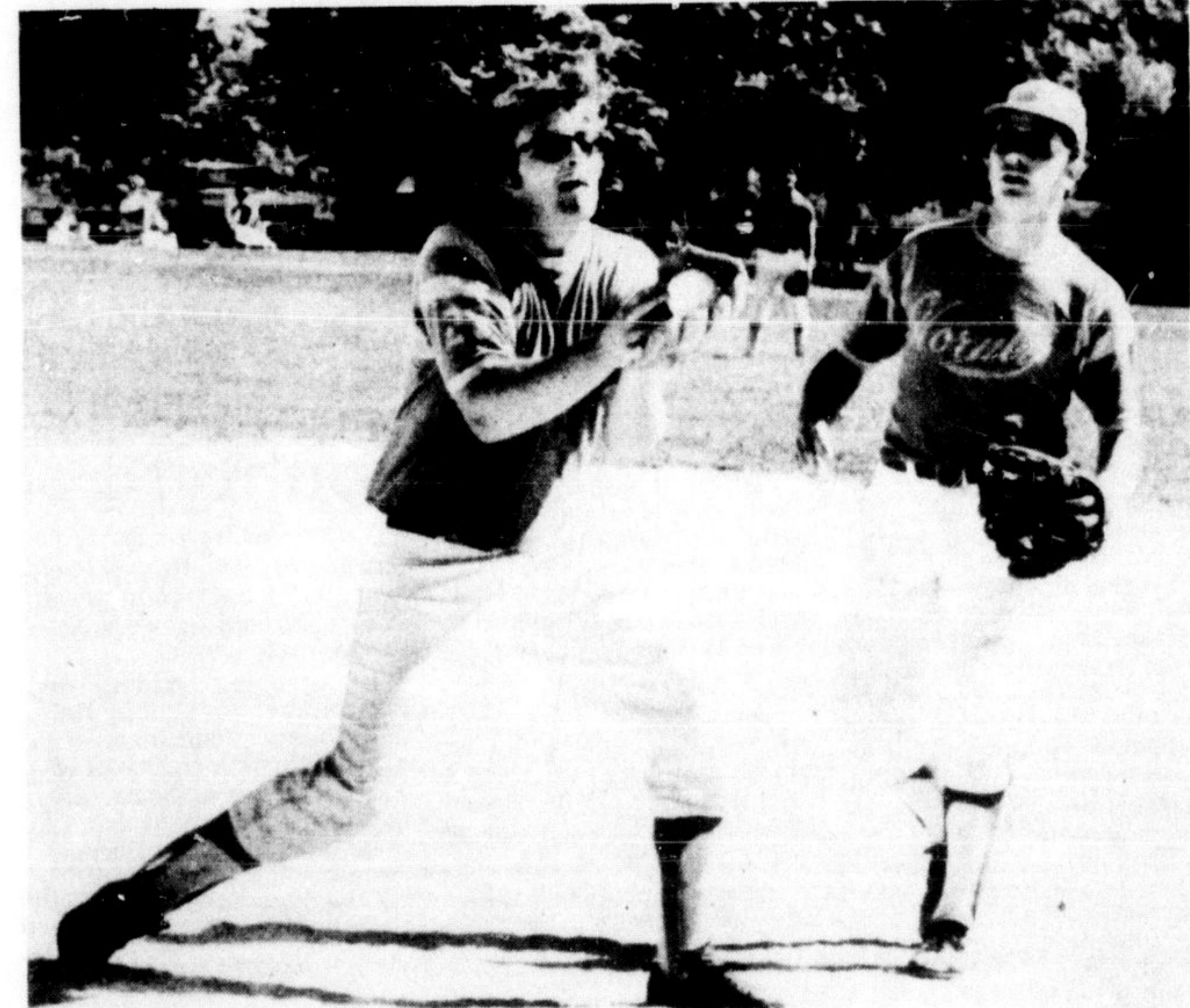
Hornby played through two wins at their Saturday afternoon tournament before losing a squeaker in the semi-final.

Campbellville Midgets held on to fourth place with two more victories last week - 4-1 over Erindale and 14-9 against Milton.

Scott Gadd engineered the win over Erindale. He allowed only five hits, walked one and struck out seven batters for his second win this season.

Campbellville scored all of their runs in the first inning as Elliott walked, Baynton doubled, and Tim Roberts followed with a long homer n over the left-field fence.

Dan Thomson reached first on an error, went to second when Robert Boomhower was hit by a pitch, and scored on Early's single.

Erindale scored their only run in the third when they worked a double steal to perfection.

Tim Roberts had a home run, while Dan Baynton doubled and Paul Elliott, Scott Gadd, Scott Early, and Bobby Baynton each singled once for Campbellville.

Paul Elliott led the way against Milton. He collected four hits and scored three runs in only five times at bat. Campbellville scored in every inning but the fourth as the game was called after five and one-half innings because of darkness.

Milton jumped into a 3-0 lead in their first but Elliott doubled, Dan Baynton reached base on an error, Roberts doubled and then scored on a fielder's choice to tie the game 3-3 after one inning.

The Villagers went ahead 6-3 in the second when Elliott singled, Baynton walked, Scott Gadd walked, Elliott scored on Robert Boomhower's sacrifice fly, and Baynton and Gadd scored on Larry Wigood's single.

In the third Ron Howard was safe on an error, Bobby Baynton reached first on a fielder's choice and scored on Paul Elliott's triple, Dan Baynton walked and Tim Roberts followed with his third home run this season over the left-field fence to push the score to 10-3.

Tim Roberts started on the mound for the villagers and allowed seven runs on eight hits while walking two and striking out three batters.

Dan Baynton relieved Roberts in the fourth and in two and two-thirds innings gave up two runs on one hit while walking two and striking out four for his third victory against two losses.

Campbellville has finished the home schedule but play in Milton and Oakville this week.

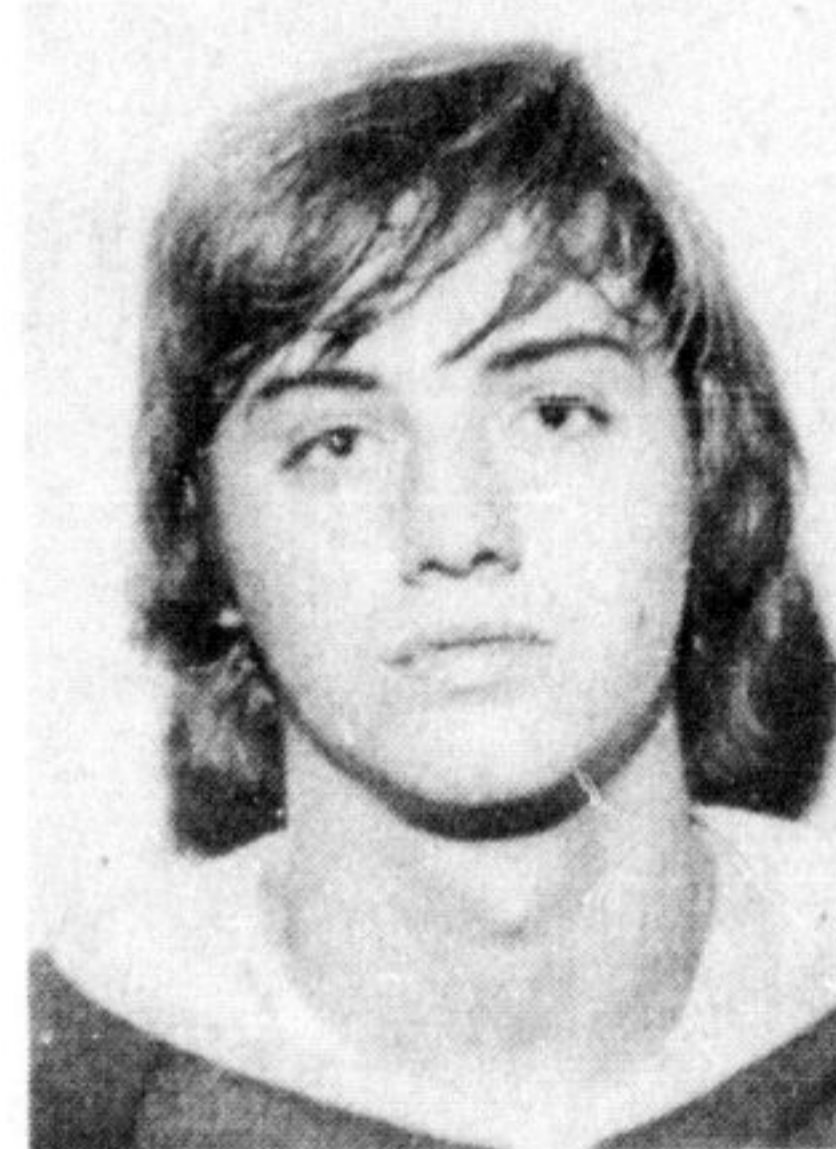
Love played his minor hockey in Georgetown before joining the Flyers two seasons ago.

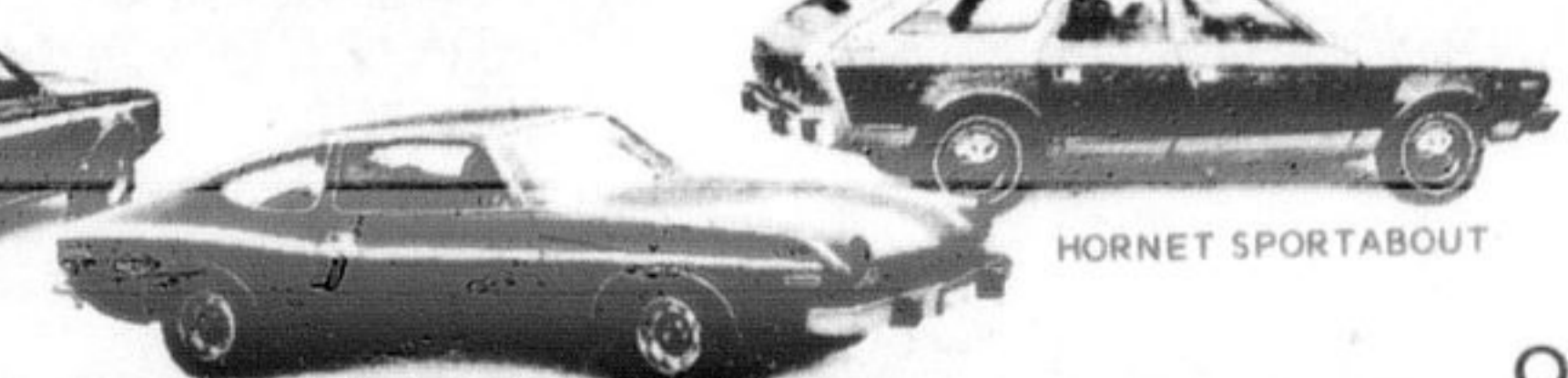
