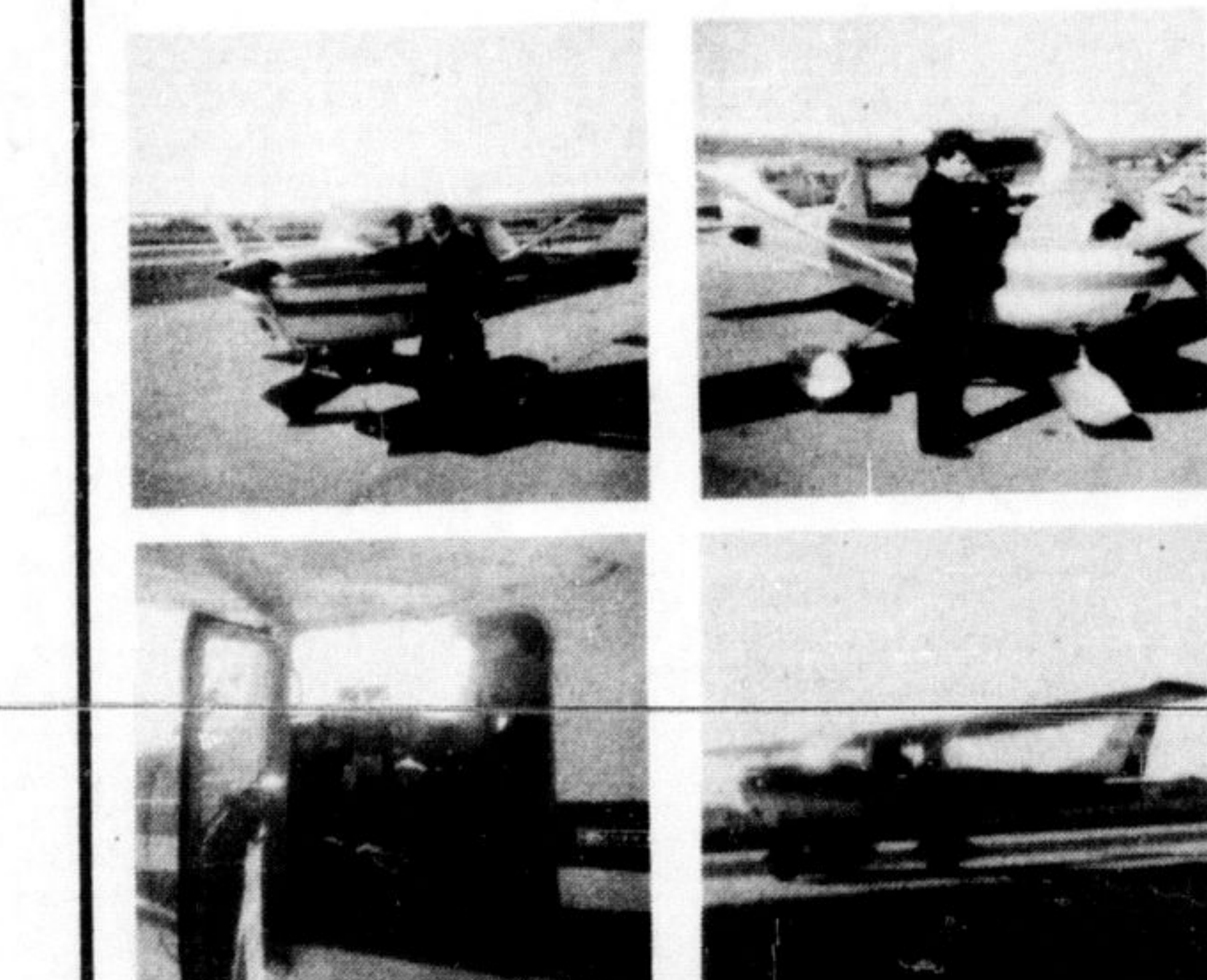

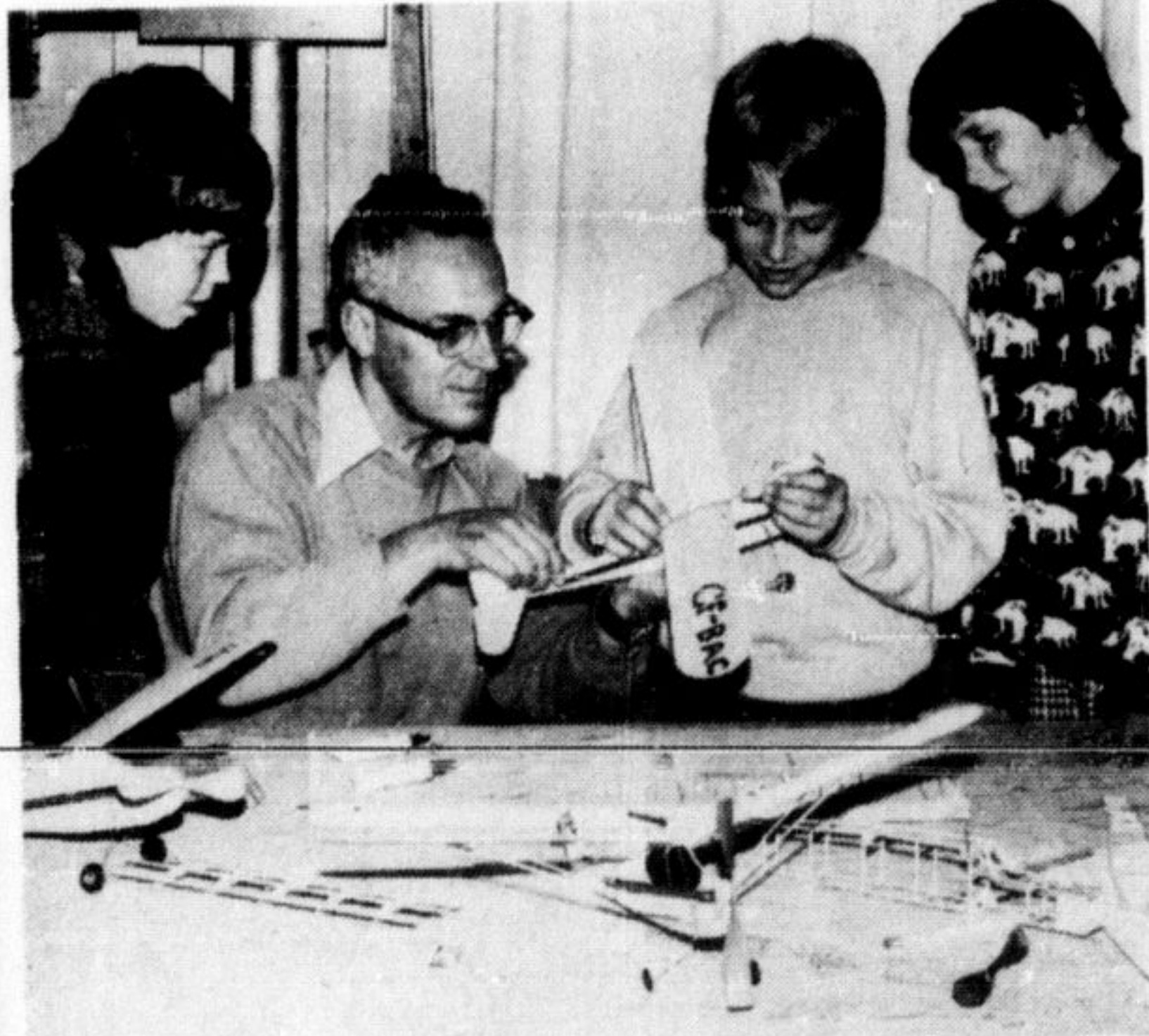

CIVILIAN crafts instructor Joe Lewin teaches model airplane building to Bud Brown (left), Peter Norsworthy and Ken Simpson.

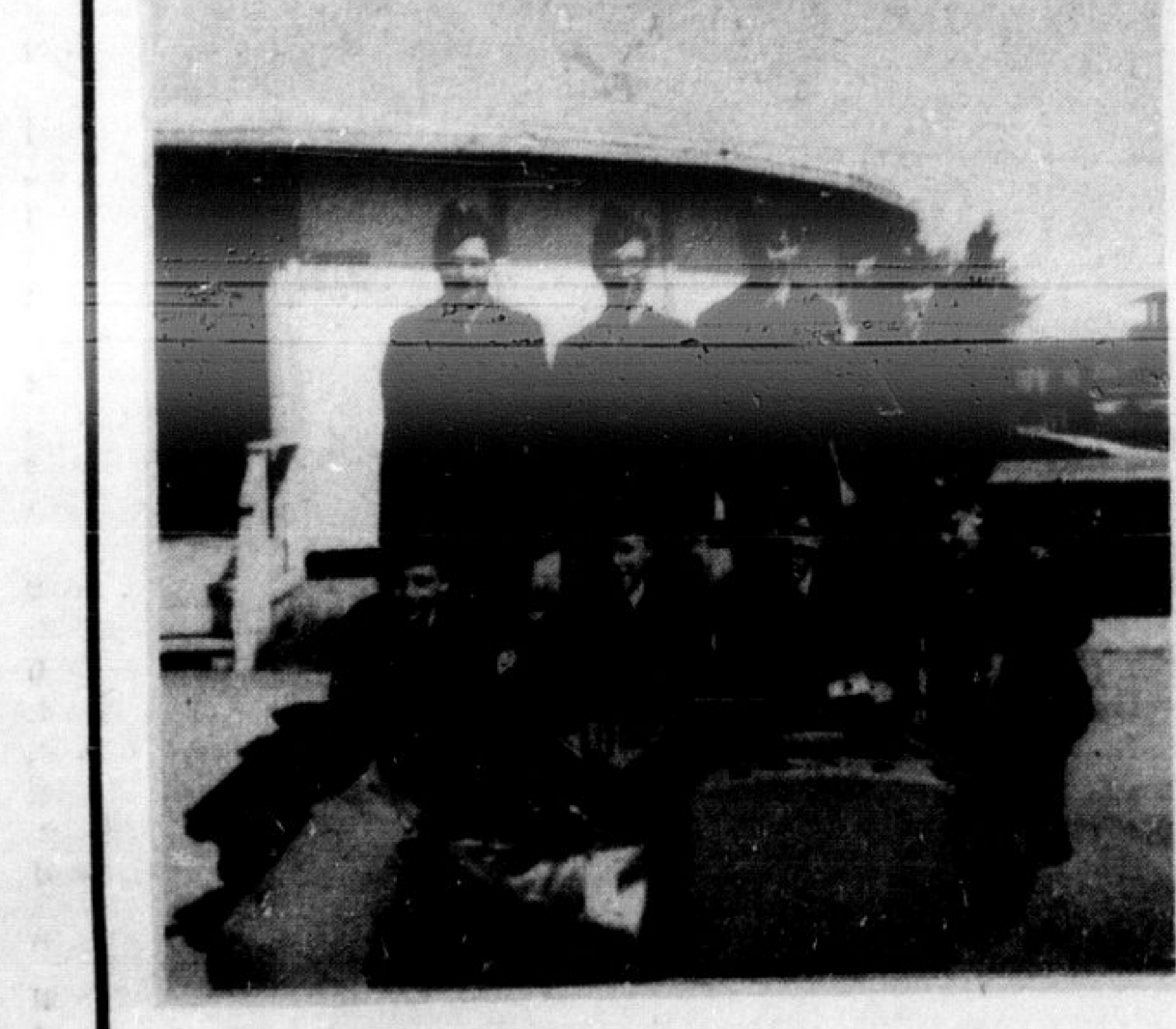

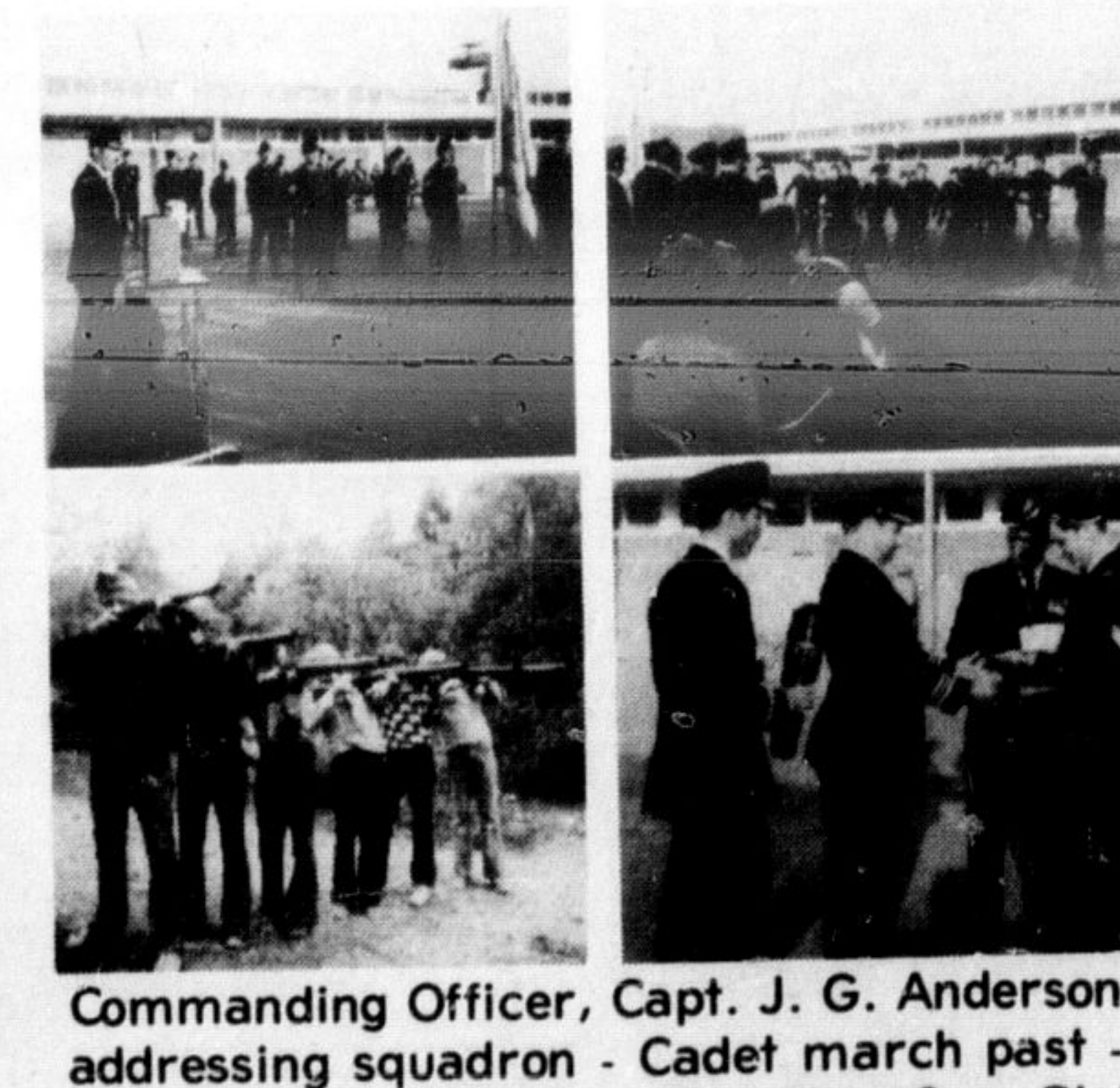
