## Study cost of water, sewers

Halton Regional Council voted to retain water and sewer services for the time being. In the same motion council ordered an analysis on the operation of the water and sewer services.

The study will indicate how much it would cost if the services were carried by the region, by the area councils or by the Public Utility Commission in the region. Regional Administration Ernie Reid and representatives of area staffs will undertake the study.

Burlington Mayor George Harrington was the chief proponent of such a study. He claimed it was only common sense to know what it will cost to carry out the function.

**Nixed by White**  
Oakville Councillor Bill Mason charged Harrington was simply trying to bog down the work of the public works committee. He pointed out Provincial Treasurer John White had ruled out the possibility of reversing the

authority for the work back to the areas.

He pleaded with council to get on with the job and provide the works department with the necessary people to get the job done. He felt the job of turning the responsibility back would be a horrendous job and would be caused by a lack of dedication to the system.

**Futility**  
Regional Treasurer Don Farmer noted there were many variables where it would be difficult to make an adequate comparison. He added that in view of White's pronouncement, the study would be an exercise in futility.

After much discussion the study was ordered on a 12-11 vote with Oakville Councillor Gord Brown absent.

In effect the decision will further delay the public works department's efforts in taking over all of the services assigned to it under the legislation.

## Rockwell expansion close to completion

North American Rockwell's \$3,000,000 building expansion is close to completion and the integration of the Milton and Oshawa plants has begun.

**Plant Manager Jack Hennessey** said all the major pieces for the new assembly line had arrived in Milton and the second line still operating in Oshawa will be transferred here soon.

Hennessey said the actual start-up time would depend on shipment of some machinery, but he noted the firm hoped to be processing steel in the new part of the plant on a trial basis at the end of this month.

**Tricky**  
The new manager explained the transition is a tricky one because the Milton

plant has to be operating as soon as possible after the Oshawa facility is closed down.

Asked about a layoff, the manager claimed the plant had no one laid off at the present time and didn't anticipate a layoff in the foreseeable future.

Hennessey agreed predictions for the economy aren't too bright but said the Milton plant was still going full blast. "You can't tell what is going to happen in the automobile business though," he admitted.

## Honor Kinsmen at Fall Council meet

He also indicated that within the next few months a National Kin Senior Citizens Project would be placed into effect in as many communities as possible across the nation.

**Several awards**  
The M.A.D. club received a number of awards for its activities, inside and outside of the community in the Kin year 1973/74. The awards were The George Budero and the C.O. Boake administration efficiency awards, recognizing at the National and District level the efficient operation of the local club; the International Relations Project Award for the club's support of the World Council of Service Men's international projects in Africa and the Middle East; the Blood Donor award to both Kinettes and Kinsmen in recognition of the club's assistance to the Milton Red Cross clinic; and Past

President Lester Wood was honored with an Outstanding President's Award "in recognition of leadership in the Association of Kinsmen Clubs."

In the spring of next year the M.A.D. Kinsmen and Kinettes will host an interclub for the nine clubs of Zone D. If adequate facilities are available the interclub will be staged in Milton and attract some 200 Kinsmen and Kinettes to town.

The plaque noted that in the previous two clinics the Kinsmen club had outdone all other service clubs in the town.
