

# Study cost of water, sewers

The study will indicate how much it would cost if the services were carried by the region, by the area councils or by the Public Utility Commissions in the region. Regional Administration Ernie Reid and representatives of area

well's \$3,000,000 building expansion is close to completion and the integration of the Milton and Oshawa plants has begun.

Plant Manager Jack Henessey said all the major pieces for the new assembly line had arrived in Milton and the second line still operating in Oshawa will be transferred here soon.

Henessey said the actual start-up time would depend machinery, but he noted the firm hoped to be processing steel in the new part of the plant on a trial basis at the end of this month. Tricky

The new manager explained the transition is tricky one because the Milton

plant has to be operating as soon as possible after the Oshawa facility is closed

Asked about a layoff, the manager claimed the plant had no one laid off at the present time and didn't anticipate a layoff in the foreseeable future.

Henessey agreed predictions for the economy aren't too bright but said the Milton plant was still going full blast. You can't tell what is going to happen in the automobile business though," he ad-
