Cautioned council

Recreation Director Bob Small recommended council accept the agreement but cautioned the members of council about letting the hall be tied up for two nights a week. He suggested the hall could be rented Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights, leaving only two nights per week for community use and programs.

Councillor Rick Day said \$20,000 seemed like a lot of money but over 10 years it

really wasn't that much.

Nadalin said he understood the town didn't have the \$20,000 to furnish the hall and pointed out that if debentures were issued, the \$20,000 would cost the town close to \$40,000 to pay off the debt over a period of years.

After considerable discussion the committee agreed to Nadalin's terms and recommended acceptance of the agreement to council.

In addition to using the facility twice a week the Lions Club will have the hall named after it. Nadalin noted the hall would be called Lions Club of Milton Hall, or something appropriate.

Robert J. Inglis

Robert Jeffrey (Bob) Inglis of Campbellville died Oct. 15, 1974 at Halton Centennial Manor. In his 94th year, Mr. Inglis had been ill for about four years. He was a retired farmer and was well known in the Milton-Campbellville area.

Mr. Inglis had spent all his life at the homestead farm at R.R. 2, Campbellville until he retired in 1947 and moved to the village. He was a great baseball fan.

His wife predeceased him in 1952, 45 years after their marriage. Surviving are a son George L. Inglis of Campbellville and a daughter Cora B. Donaven of 922 Danforth Place, Burlington. Also surviving are three grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

He was a member of St. David's Presbyterian Church, Campbellville and Rev. Douglas Lowry of St. David's conducted the funeral service at the McKersie Funeral Home on Oct. 17. Interment was in the church cemetery.

Johnson on radio

Local resident Bill Johnson and Pollution Probe's Peter Love are scheduled to be guests at a phone-in broadcast on the Brampton radio station this Friday afternoon. The topic is garbage.

Johnson, a resident of the Milton area that was formerly Nassagaweya, is president of GUARD (Group United Against Rural Dumping) and a representative of Ontario Garbage Coalition. The two men expect to field station -CHIC listeners' queries about rural garbage dumping and solid waste disposal sites and Johnson suggested anyone in the Ashgrove area wanting information on so-called "sanitary" landfill sites is invited to call in.

Halton Regional Council is currently dealing with a consultant's proposal to locate a major landfill site near Ashgrove, to handle all of Halton's garbage, and Johnson is one of the most vociferous opponents.

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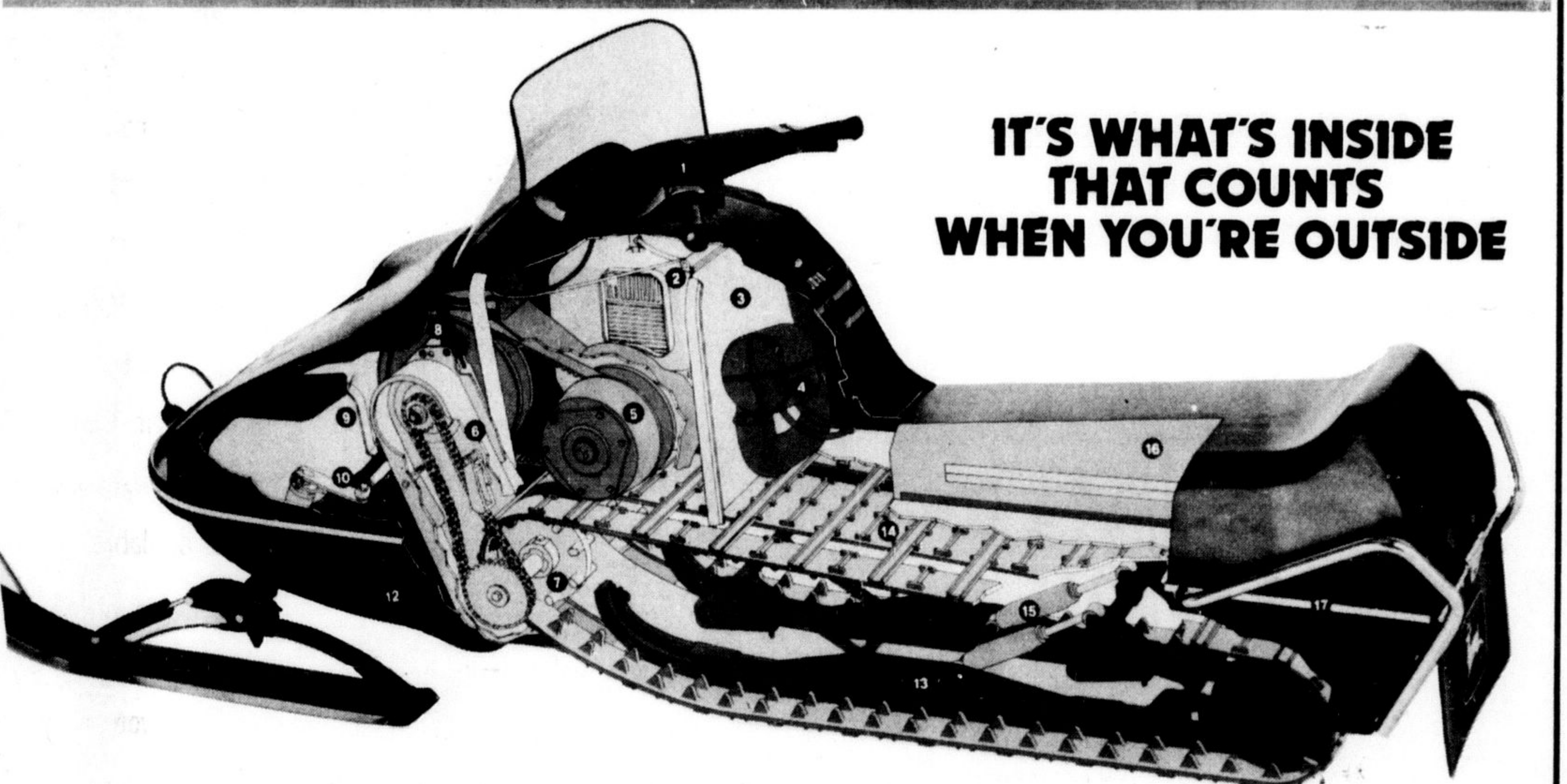
